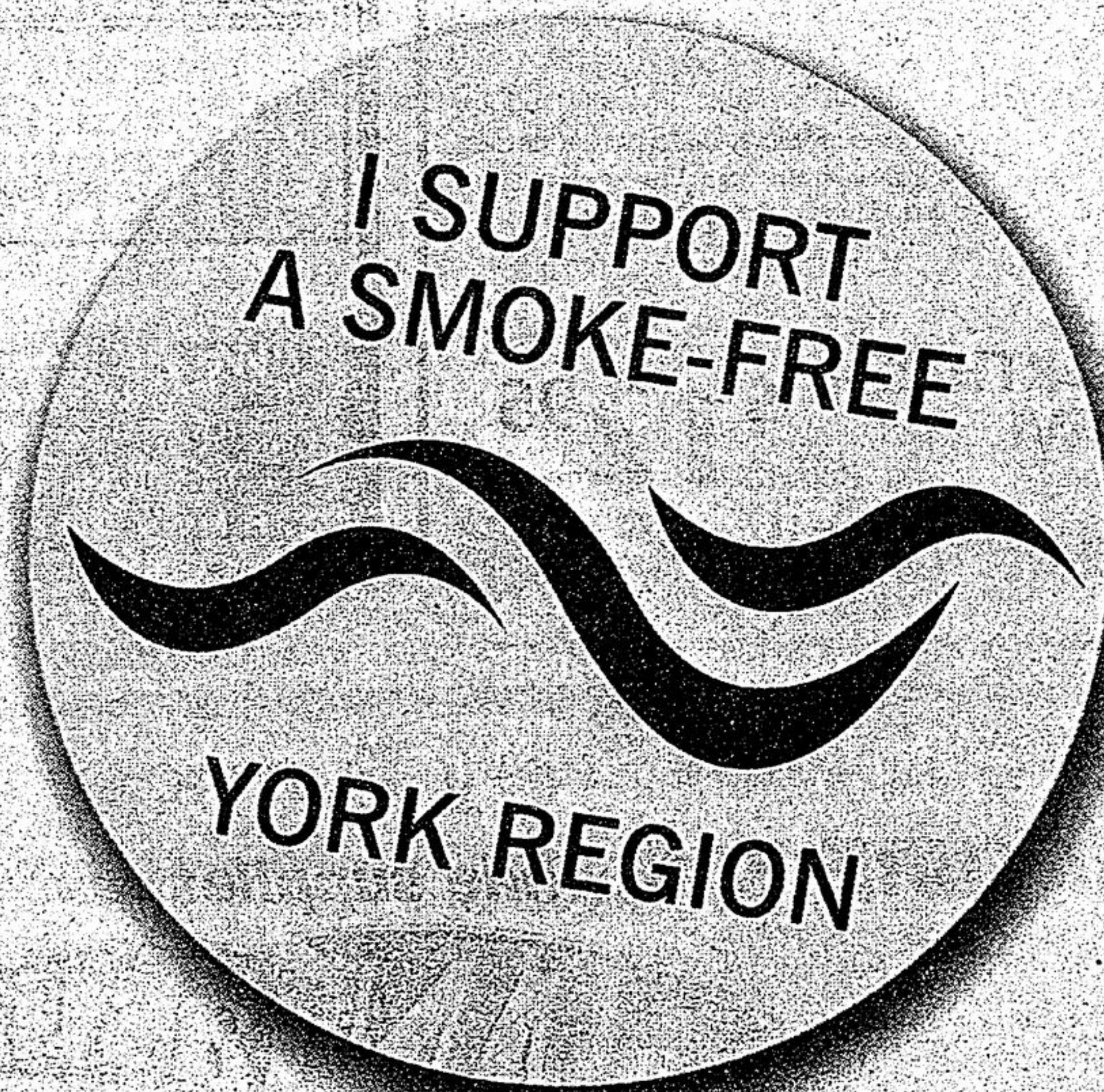


Thanks For Your Support

Not all hockey fans were glued to their televisions to watch the end of the playoff dream, though.

Surprisingly some had given up on the Leafs long before the beginning of the Carolina series, believing the end was just a matter of time.

"I was expecting them to be out a long time ago," said Markville high school student Kristen Nord. "I think most people were. I was pretty sure this was going to be the end," she said.

Whatever their point of view, most people cheered the Leafs for having done as well as they did.
