Rouge River fishway finally gets the green light

Better late than never. A fish ladder will be built at the Milne Park dam site on the Rouge River in Markham after all.

The fishway was supposed to have been built three years ago but was put on hold for several reasons, said the Ministry of Natural Resources. Now, it's a go.

Mark Heaton, a fisheries biologist with the ministry's Aurora District office, said construction is expected to begin Sept. 3.

Among the primary reasons for the prolonged delay, Heaton revealed, were design modifications that were required to meet the Fisheries Act guidelines.

"There were some sea lamprey control elements that were incorporated in the design and that was a major concern for approval under the Fisheries Act," said Heaton, who is also the project facilitator.

Another hurdle which delayed construction was financing and in particular, who would be responsible for outlaying the money to cover all of the costs. With an estimated cost somewhere near \$500,000, Heaton said with assurance that the required funding is now secured.

"We've got the modified

fish in negotiating their way around the 4.5-metre high concrete dam at Milne Park.


The problem with a vertical ladder, Heaton said, is that it limits entrance to certain species of fish that can jump such as salmon or trout.

A denil model is comprised of a series of rectangular concrete pipes that have baffles and creates turbulence. It also reduces the velocity of water, which in turn allows all species to go through.

With close to 55 different species of fish currently inhabiting the Rouge River, Heaton said the denil model would allow all of these species to utilize it.

Upon negotiating the fishway, the species would have access to some 50 kilometres of water on the Rouge River and its tributaries that extend near the Elgin Mills and Bayview Avenue areas in Richmond Hill. In past years when rainbow trout were transferred manually over the Milne Dam, these headwaters were utilized for their spring spawning ritual.

There are two denil fishways in use in the Greater Toronto Area on the Humber River at the Board of Trade Golf Club in Woodbridge and at Raymore Park just south of Highway 401.
