

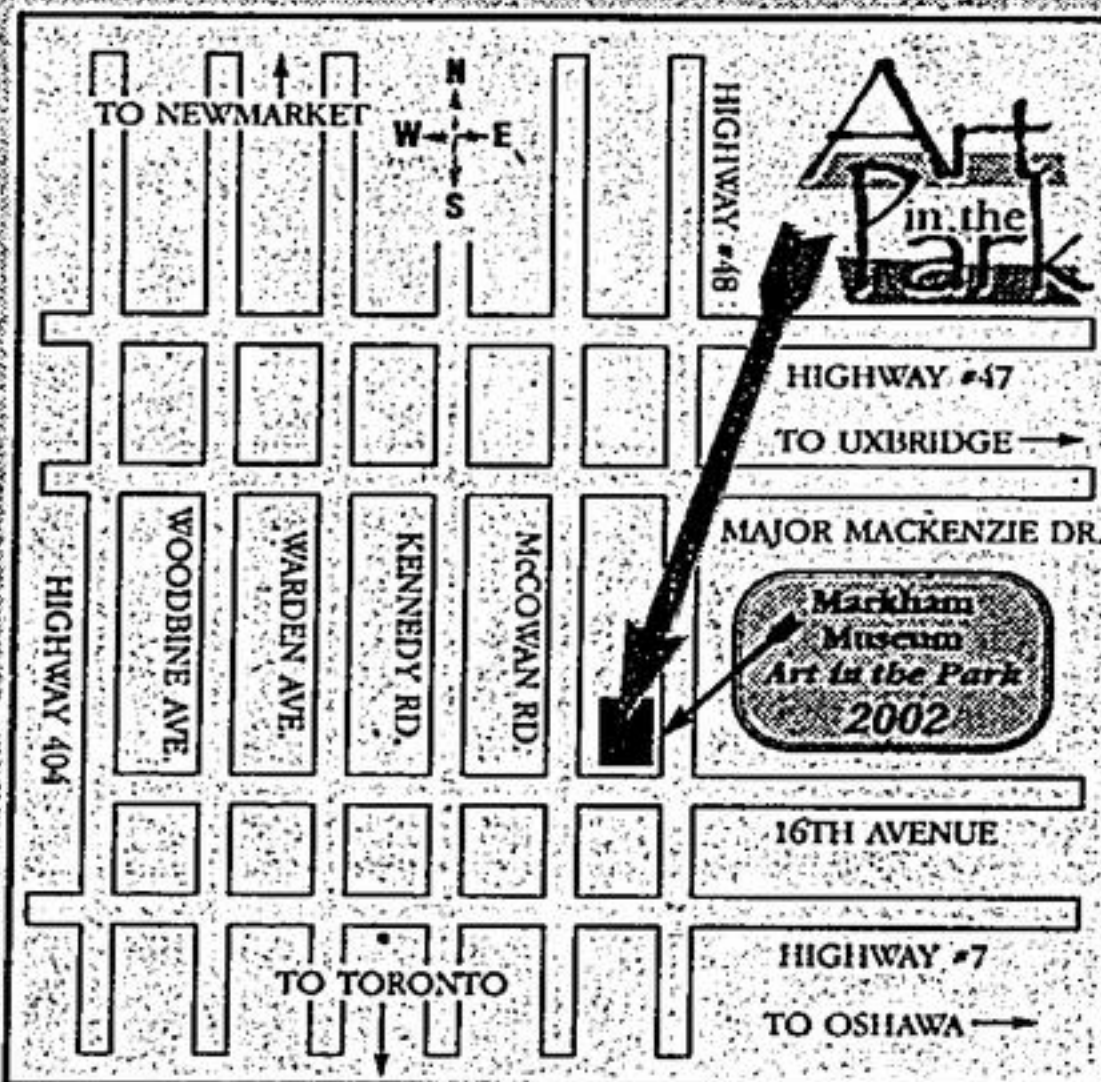

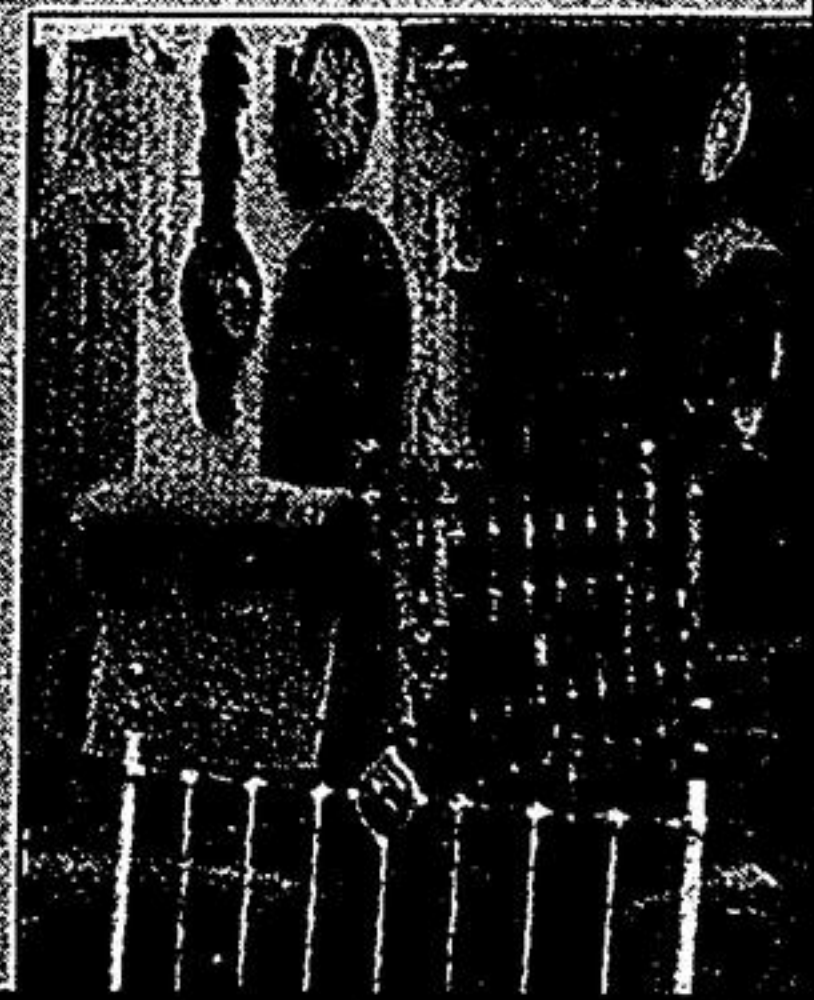

infant and six months for a toddler," said Ms Keeling. "Even if we had space it would be taken up by local children."

With some day cares unable to take on the city's overflow, York Region day programs and camps are hearing the call.

Whitchurch-Stouffville's weekly camps have space available for Toronto parents willing to make the trip.

"We've had calls from parents; we're running on a first-come, first-serve basis," said Nicole Long, aquatic program supervisor at Lebovic Leisure Centre in Stouffville.

"We're usually at capacity at the pool now; if people start arriving from the city, we'd have to get people in and out of the water in shifts by blowing whistles," Ms Long said. "But we'd do it."

Some local child-care workers are concerned at how Toronto parents will find day-care spaces during the strike.

"Parents have to put kids with neighbours and relatives; some parents in desperation may be leaving young children alone," Ms Timney speculated.

"However, if they remember the last time there was a strike they were pretty good at being proactive and putting co-operative day-care systems in place," she noted.

Stu Taylor, acting director for recreation services for the Town of Markham, says phones have been ringing off the hook since the inside workers strike began.

But the town's day camps won't have any space available until next month.
