Di Leo hopes for home crowd inspiration at Molson Indy

Markham driver is gaining experience in his rookie year on the Barber Dodge Pro Series circuit



Daniel Di Leo hopes the sports adage of home field advantage will be a factor in auto racing.

With the Molson Indy set to take place this weekend in Toronto, Di Leo is returning home to compete in the Barber Dodge Pro Series race, which takes place Sunday at 11 a.m., prior to the CART/Fedex championship race at 1:30 p.m.

Currently in his rookie year on the circuit, the 20-year-old Markham resident is coming off an impressive second-place finish in his last outing two weeks ago in Portland, Oregon.

Racing this weekend in front of family and close friends, Di

Leo is looking forward to his homecoming of sorts.

"I'm heading into the race with lots of confidence," said Di Leo, who just completed his first year of studies at Ryerson University where he's majoring in business management.

"The car is working good right now, the set up is good and I know family and friends will be cheering for me."

Currently sitting sixth in the series standings and second in the rookie standings, Di Leo is quite happy with the progress he's made so far.

He acknowledged having a slow start. Part of it, he said, was due to inexperience.

"I had to pay my dues with the car; the veteran drivers have the edge in knowing their car and having more time in it and from there it all snowballs," he explained.

Reflecting on his season, Di Leo said the most important thing he's learned so far is the amount of work that has to be put in. Not just on the track, he said, but off of it as well.

Part of his offroad responsibilities, he said, is in searching for sponsors to help pay the bills in an expensive sport.

"I've been working pretty hard, but for me, racing is a job off the track just as well."

Cougars lose heartbreaker to New York in fast-pitch tournament

The Markham Cougars advanced to the final of last weekend's Civitan Fast Pitch Jamboree in Kitchener before being edged 3-2 in a tiebreaker to the New York Diamond Girls.

Trailing 2-0 through three

innings against a team comprised

of players a year older, the Cougars rallied with a run in the fourth and one in the sixth to tie the game.

Left-fielder Meghan Sullivan enabled Markham to stay in contention with solid defence including four consecutive catches.

In extra innings after New York scored the go-ahead run, the Cougars came within inches of tying the game when Sullivan slid home on a play with two out, but was called out on a close call.

Finishing second out of seven teams in the round-robin with a 4-

1 mark, Markham received a three-hit pitching effort from Charlsie Searle to blank the seventh-ranked Guelph Gators 5-0 in a quarter-final game.

Facing top-ranked Scarborough in a rematch, the Cougars were backed by a strong pitching

effort from Joey Kyriazis, who had a no-hitter entering the final inning, before emerging with a 5-2 win and berth in the final.

The loss by Scarborough was just its second of the season.

Molson gives rugby club a helping hand

Markham receives \$3,000 grant from Molson Canada to assist in clubhouse construction

When the Markham Rugby Club began the construction of its 3,200-square foot clubhouse a year ago, the goal was to make it as inviting as possible to players and spectators.

With the project — at Austin Park — nearing completion, the club received some additional support from Molson Canada.

Through its Local Heroes program, Molson gave the club a \$3,000 grant to assist in the installation of a new walkway and viewing deck.

Club president Jim Monk said the timing couldn't be better.

"Every little bit helps," said Monk.

Noting the grant came about in rather quick fashion, Monk praised the work of project co-ordinator Colin Campbell, who had the initiative to contact Molson Canada.
