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Flu shots are useful for all, medical officer insists

Mention outbreaks of West Nile virus, E. coli or meningitis and the public reacts with alarm.

On the other hand, influenza, or the flu as it is commonly called, barely warrants a passing thought by most adults.

However, while York Region associate medical officer of health Dr. Hanif Kassam can't compare one disease to another, he warns the flu is a more prevalent illness and can be a bigger killer than other health scares.

At particular risk are the elderly and people suffering from respiratory, kidney and cardiac diseases and diabetes.

"If you compare the flu to something like E. coli, the numbers who die (from influenza) are significantly higher," Dr. Kassam said.

He is hoping to convince the 60 per cent of adults who aren't taking advantage of free annual flu shots to get immunized as a way of stopping the spread of the highly contagious viral infection.

Beginning today and running until Nov. 9, public health nurses will be holding clinics where residents can receive free flu shots.

A flyer outlining the schedule of clinics can be found inserted in today's *Economist & Sun/Tribune*.

"There is a benefit to all of society in receiving the flu shot. The single most effective method to prevent the flu is

being immunized," said Dr. Kassam, who received his shot Tuesday afternoon.

"In the last years, there have been random trials that have shown the benefits of the vaccine.

"There are benefits in the workplace for employers and employees in reducing absenteeism. I would generally recommend (the flu shot) to all people."

According to Bill Mindell, York Region's director of infectious diseases control, there were 29 reported cases of E. coli 0157:H7 in the region in 2000, 23 cases in 2001 and 25 this year to date.

Meanwhile, there were nine reported cases of meningococcal meningitis in York in 2000, three cases in 2001 and two so far this year.

By comparison, during the 1998/99 flu season, York had 76 reported cases of influenza and seven flu outbreaks in long-term care facilities. There were 101 reported flu cases and 14 outbreaks in the 1999/00 season.

During the 2000/01 season — the first time the province provided universal free flu shots to all Ontarians — flu cases in York dropped to 38 while there was only one outbreak.

Mr. Mindell pointed out virtually all cases of E. coli and meningitis are reported to public health.

However, many cases of the flu aren't reported, meaning there are dozens of cases of influenza that aren't included in the statistics.

"Many people have influenza but we only track the presence of it on a surveillance basis," Mr. Mindell said.

The flu is transmitted by droplets expelled by coughing and sneezing. The "most effective" transmitters of influenza are children, according to Dr. Kassam.

After an incubation period of one to four days, victims will exhibit symptoms that include headache, fever, loss of appetite, weakness, malaise, aches and pains and severe muscle pain.

With bed rest of aspirin, most patients will recover in about a week.

However, some patients will develop pneumonia, which can result in death from hemorrhaging in the lungs.

There are two main strains of the flu, a more prevalent Type A and Type B, which is more severe.

Dr. Kassam speculated many people don't understand how serious influenza is because general aches and pains or gastrointestinal bugs are often wrongly called "the flu."

That makes it easy to perceive the flu as a mild illness rather than a serious and contagious infection.

Dr. Kassam disputed claims flu shots can make recipients suffer from flu-like symptoms.

He stressed symptoms of the flu shot are minimal and are generally contained to a little pain in the area around where the needle was administered.
