Smithson's heroics propel Spirit to victory

Overtime goal is his first in five years as member of Stouffville Junior A squad

J.D. Smithson has done a lot of things as a member of the Stouffville Spirit.

But on Thursday, he recorded a first.

Smithson's second goal of the game, at the 2:36-mark in overtime, gave the Spirit a comefrom-behind 4-3 win at the Stouffville Arena over the Ajax Axeman. The win boosted the Spirit into third place in the North Con-ference of the Provincial Junior A Hockey League.

Smithson, the first five-year player in the Spirit's eight-year history, has now scored 49 goals and totalled 204 points in 207 games with the franchise. But Thursday's goal was his first in overtime.

The 20-year-old Seneca College stu-

dent, who lives in Maple, could be lost to the team for the rest of the season later this fall.

Smithson heads to the training camp of the pro lacrosse Calgary Roughnecks next month. He was a third-round pick of the second-year franchise this fall.

"Calgary has said I have a shot," said Smithson, who played junior A lacrosse for the Toronto Beaches. "I just have to prove that I can play at the pro
