

Foote has fond memories of her sporting endeavours

Former SDSS athlete of the year is happy in Singapore doing volunteer work

It's a long way from Stouffville to Singapore.

And vice versa.

Air service takes hours and postal service takes days.

But e-mail spans the distance in seconds.

I know.

For I recently conducted my first e-mail interview over the internet. With excellent results.

During a recent visit to Stouffville District Secondary School, I took the time to survey the sports leader board outside the gymnasium. There, I noticed the name Joan Foote, voted Female Athlete of the Year 1962-63. That was 40 years ago. Her male counterpart was Ian Montgomery.

Through the process of elimination, I contacted Joan's parents, Bruce and Marie Foote in Lindsay and they put me in touch with Joan's sister, Helen, now living at Guelph. Helen forwarded me Joan's e-mail address in far away Singapore.

Thus began an interview, I asking the questions and Joan, now Mrs. Casey Chan, providing the answers.

The end result was intriguing, even amazing.

Joan (Wilson-Chan) Foote, 55, a native of Oshawa, moved to a farm on 19th Avenue in Markham at an early age. She attended Mongolia Public School and later Stouffville District Secondary School, graduating in 1967.

For two years, Joan served on the staff of Toronto Western Hospital and it was there, through a friend, she met and later married Jim Wilson, an engineering degree student attending the University of Western Ontario.

From 1974 to 1984, Joan and Jim lived and worked in Nigeria, Iran, Montreal, Alberta and Newfoundland, moving from place to place as his employment dictated.

"Africa was definitely an experience," recalls Joan, "it gave me a greater appreciation of Canada, since life in Nigeria was something less than ideal."

They escaped from Iran only a day before serious rioting broke out.

Jim died in 1985.

While employed at the Montreal General Hospital, Joan met and married Dr. Casey Chan, an orthopedic surgeon there. Before heading for Singapore, her husband's birthplace, they resided in Joplin, Missouri, and

Lubbock, Texas.

Dr. Chan presently teaches orthopedic surgery and works in the administration office at the National University Health Centre in Singapore.

Joan, now retired from nursing, concentrates on volunteer work as the same university where her husband is employed.

Joan retains fond memories of athletic involvements, both at elementary and secondary school levels. These included basketball, softball, volleyball, football, track and field and gymnastics.

"What do I remember?" she asks. "I remember smelly gyms and change rooms; fun-filled bus rides; joys and despairs of successes and failures; sore muscles; torn ligaments; pains and sprains, but most of all, team spirit and camaraderie."

Joan remembers the senior girls' basketball team winning the southern Ontario championship and being part of a relay team that set a southern Ontario record.

"I remember winning a track and field title on a badly torn left ankle after pleading with Barbara Button not to tell her father for fear he'd place my leg in a cast."

"My high school years were great years," Joan recalls, "made great by my schoolmates; by phys. ed. teachers Mr. Rehill and Miss Martinni and by my parents."

Joan says her love of sports kept her in school "and set me up for the life I now lead."

Sports, she says, taught her "the necessity of flexibility, tolerance and the need for graciousness and serenity during times of stress."

"I'll never forget Mr. Mercer," says Joan. "He gave me an appreciation of music and geometry; Mr. Smith, a love of literature; Mrs. Marlatt and Mrs. Gresham, an appreciation of languages and Mr. Marshall who I adored although I continually botched chemistry experiments."

Joan says her athletic interests decreased somewhat after school. She now concentrates on jogging and tennis.

Joan describes Singapore as "a delightful country; a clean and safe place to live."

"I can even buy Canadian tea and maple syrup here," she says.

English is the language of commerce and education.


"While I don't miss shovelling snow, I do miss the changing seasons, especially spring," she says, "ripe field tomatoes and fresh sweet corn."

And Stouffville District Secondary School misses her.

While long gone, Joan (Wilson-Chan) Foote hasn't been forgotten. Her MVP accomplishment of 1962-63, etched in bronze, remains a constant reminder.
