pre-schooler unconscious with a concussion and scar tissue on her brain.

The seizures increased in frequency and severity during her adolescence and into her 20s. She was having one or two a month, although it eventually decreased to about one every six to eight months.

Ms Hoffman went for more than four years without any seizures.

When they returned, however, she was having between six and eight a day and the convulsions were severe. Often, she ended up in hospital for days because the convulsions wouldn't stop without medical intervention.

Six years ago, Ms Hoffman had brain surgery, which reduced the frequency of the seizures and tempered the convulsions.

Still, she was feeling left out of mainstream society. She didn't leave home without her husband for two-and-a-half years.

"People were becoming afraid of me and afraid to be with me anywhere in public."

Ms Hoffman called an agency that provided the hearing impaired with service dogs and asked if the organization could help her.

While there weren't dogs trained to deal specifically with seizure illnesses, the agency and Ms Hoffman worked to train Seiko to assist her.

I feel like I've been freed from a horrific secret.

Almost two years ago, Ms Hoffman got Cherokee as a service dog.

The dogs opened up the world again for Ms Hoffman because friends and family knew the animals, by recognizing signs, would alert Ms Hoffman when a seizure was coming and protect her during an episode.

"I'm not limited socially. I feel like I've been freed from a horrific secret."

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The Regional Municipality of York NOTICE OF PUBLIC CONSULTATION CENTRE WOODBINE AVENUE (Y.R. 8) TRANSPORTATION AND CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT STUDY

The Regional Municipality of York has retained Earth Tech Canada Inc. to carry out a Transportation and Class Environmental Assessment (EA) study to accommodate increasing traffic volumes in the vicinity of Woodbine Avenue (Y.R. 8) between 19th Avenue and Major Mackenzie Drive. Woodbine Avenue is currently a Regional two-lane north-south arterial road that bisects the Hamlet of Victoria Square. The Study Area generally encompasses the area from Leslie Street to the west, Warden Avenue to the east, 19th Avenue to the north and Major Mackenzie Drive to the south. Due to known constraints within the Hamlet of Victoria Square, a Woodbine Avenue Bypass of the Hamlet will be one of the alternative solutions evaluated as part of this study.

The study is being undertaken in accordance with the *Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (2000)* process for a Schedule 'C' project. The Class EA process includes public and review agency consultation, an evaluation of alternatives, an assessment of the impacts on the environment, and identification of reasonable measures to mitigate any adverse impacts.

As part of the Class EA planning process, a Public Consultation Centre (PCC) is being held to present the preliminary results to date, including the need and justification for the project, the recommended solution, and the alternative design concepts under consideration, for public comment. Attendees will have the opportunity to discuss their comments directly with Earth Tech Canada and York Region staff. The PCC is scheduled for:

2929 Elgin Mills Road
(just west of Woodbine Avenue)

You are encouraged to attend the PCC and provide your comments so that they may be included in the study. We are interested in hearing any comments or concerns that you may have about this project. Any comments received at the PCC will be considered in identifying the preferred solution. Following this, the alternative design concepts will be evaluated for presentation at a second PCC to be held in 2003. The public will be notified of the date, time and location of the second PCC at the appropriate time through a similar newspaper notice.
