Spirit hopes to tame Terriers in playoffs

The Stouffville Spirit can forget the fact it owned the Couchiching Terriers during the 2002-2003 Provincial Junior A Hockey League regular season.

The emphasis is on regular season in the 4-1-1 mark the Spirit held over the Orillia-area Terriers this year.

"The cliches are right: it means nothing," said Spirit head coach Brian Perrin yesterday. "We spent 49 games preparing for the playoffs. We'll find out Thursday if we're ready."

Game 1 of the best-of-seven goes Thursday night and Game 3 Sunday afternoon at the Stouffville Arena. Games 2 (Friday) and 4 (Tuesday) will be played in Rama.

Remaining games, if necessary will rotate between the two towns.

The 29-18-2-0 Spirit finished third in the North Conference. The 20-23-4-1 Terriers were fifth.

"But they seem to have been our nemesis over the years," said Perrin, in his fifth year at the helm of the Spirit.

"That's been the difference this season. They guys know each other."


Utilizing the Spirit's speed is key, said Perrin.

Kevin Jarman had two goals to help the Spirit jump out to a 5-0 lead. Brent Chandler, Jordan Mabley and Ty Raine had singles.

The victory came on the heels of a 5-0 road loss to the Aurora Tigers on Friday.

Flemming shoots out lights at college

A 19-year-old Stouffville resident is maintaining a level of basketball excellence at Redeemer Christian University she displayed at Stouffville District Secondary School.

Hannah Flemming, a first-year kinesiology student at the Ancaster, Ont., school, shocked the college world recently by posting 19 three-pointers in a shooting contest to win an all-Ontario championship.

The competition was part of an all-star basketball weekend in Toronto hosted by Seneca College. Other participating schools included Mohawk, Fanshawe, Durham, Algoma, Georgian, Royalist, Niagara and George Brown.

Ms Flemming was one of 20

students taking part.

"Hannah was absolutely phenomenal," Redeemer coach Lorne McInnes said later. "She won all three rounds."

McInnes said Ms Flemming could have been a member of the Redeemer starting lineup but because she's a first-year student, this wasn't allowed.

"It's the first time a female basketball player attending our university ever won anything," McInnes said.

The tournament was sponsored by the Ontario Colleges Athletic Association.

Ms Flemming is a member of the Redeemer varsity basketball team, playing as a shooting guard or at point.

"She's a team leader, appreciated by all her mates," says McInnes. Her achievement, McInnes said,


was all the more outstanding because Redeemer University has a student enrollment of only 700. Some competing colleges have several thousand students.

The three-point championship resulted in the presentation of several awards.

Ms Flemming's accomplishment should come as no surprise to physical education instructors at SDSS.

She was named athlete of the year in Grade 9 and the most valuable player in several Grade 9 and Grade 11 basketball tournaments. In Grade 11, she was a member of the school's athletic council.

"Hannah's maintaining a tradition, representing her former school and town extremely well," McInnes concluded.
