

Raine leads Spirit to victory

Ty Raine had no problem coming up with a smile at a Stouffville Spirit photo session at the Stouffville Arena Monday.

Twenty-four hours earlier, the second-year forward exploded for four points as the Spirit scored five unanswered goals in the third period to defeat the Mississauga Chargers 9-5 at College Weekend in Mississauga.

"Good timing" said the 17-year-old from Markham, who caught the attention of U.S. schools last year.

played in front of North American college scouts, also brought Stouffville's record to 2-3-0.

Conway, a 15-year-old from the suburbs of Cleveland, Ohio, earned the win in his first junior game. The Pittsburgh AAA goaltending product was cleared to play through U.S. authorities earlier in the day.

Boyce, who came to the Spirit this year from its junior C affiliate, the Uxbridge Bruins, led Stouffville with a goal and three assists.

Other scorers were Kropman, Raine, Randy Johnston, Van Allen, Carson Devine, Buckley, Simon Gysbers and Will Acton.

The Spirit outshot Huntsville 48-15, including 19-3 in the first period, and held period leads of 6-1 and 7-1.

Stouffville hosts Collingwood tonight at 7:30. It plays Couchiching in Orillia tomorrow and St. Michael's in Toronto Sunday.
