

# Bat Boy wings its way to Ontario

Former Stouffville resident Michael McGinn is the director of *Bat Boy*, a quirky musical which previews in Toronto Wednesday.

The *New Yorker* described the musical as having "the plot of a Hollywood B-movie, a rockin' musical score and wicked humour with a serious intellectual undercurrent..."

It is currently on run in London, England.

The story begins with the discovery of a small creature, half bat and half boy, by three teenagers exploring a cave in West Virginia.

The creature tries to make the transformation into a respectable citizen after being taken in by a family that both adores and despises him. However, things soon start to go wrong.

Jay T. Schramek is *Bat Boy* and Laura Caswell plays *Bat Boy's* love interest. Both are from Toronto.

"I have had a lot of success with musical theatre — fun, crazy kinds of shows," Mr. McGinn said.

He describes *Bat Boy* as a journey of self-discovery, with the main character representing Everyman.

Along the way, this homage to musical theatre manages to highlight styles from vaudeville to *Lez Miserables*, *Cats*, *Miss Saigon*, *Jesus Christ*

Superstar and other productions.

Mr. McGinn has been directing for 15 years, with a smattering of acting and producing thrown in. He's been fortunate, he said, in being able to work in his home country. Most of his work has been in the Toronto and southern Ontario area.

"Crafting together enough work to keep busy... it is a very lucky thing," he said. "I have been fortunate enough to be successful with it."

He was assistant director at the Stratford Festival for three seasons and director in residence for the York Region Catholic School board for four years.

At the Meaford Theatre, he was part of the team directing works such as *Cabaret*, *The Fantastic Voyage of Christopher Columbus* and *Cheatin' Hearts*.

He has been teaching acting and musical theatre at George Brown College, The Drama Workshop and at York University, all in Toronto, and for the musical theatre department at

the University of Windsor.

As the resident teacher for Etobicoke Creative Arts/Arts Express, he will be directing a children's version of *Macbeth* for Rhombus Media shortly.

He has also directed *Godspell 2000* at the Bathurst Street Theatre and *Forbidden Broadway*, *Almost Famous* and *The Sound of Music* at the Limelight Dinner Theatre in Toronto.

Mr. McGinn attended Stouffville District Secondary School before going on to studies in act-

ing at the University of Waterloo and musical theatre at Sheridan College in Oakville.

This summer, he'll be returning to the Toronto Zoo to direct another *Amazing Animal Show*, starring the keepers and animals of the zoo.

*Bat Boy's* regular run opens Feb. 22 and continues until April 16 at the Bathurst Street Theatre.
