Tax hike would hit riders

Sorbara, members of the assessment corporation and agricultural groups, said Andrea McGill, marketing and communications co-ordinator for the Richmond Hill-based Ontario Equestrian Federation.

Meetings are going on now and the committee has launched a letter-writing campaign asking federation members to appeal directly to the government.

The assessment corporation initiated an "aggressive" program of reassessments across the province over the past two years, task force chairperson Leslie Brooks said.

WILL NOT SURVIVE

"MPAC has begun to apply a little used legislative provision to reassess the property tax classification for boarding and lesson stables," Ms Brooks said. "The financial impact is so severe, many horse barns will not survive."

Furthermore, "MPAC makes the reassessments retroactive up to two years for newly assessed buildings, resulting in, for many equestrian facilities, property tax bills for tens of thousands of dollars, some due and payable in a matter of weeks," she said.

Individual barn owners simply don't generate the revenue commercial property rates were established for. The changes for the future years are bad enough but the retroactive bill can be financially disastrous."

The issue is far-reaching, Mrs. Hetherington said, noting it applies to riders, horse owners, students, barn owners and related horse industries.

HORSE CAPITAL

York Region is known to some as the horse capital of Canada, being home to 1,365 horse farms and 17,612 horses.

Riding establishments are not the "playground of the wealthy," Ms Brooks said. "Providing riding lessons to children and adults, children's summer camp programs, therapeutic riding programs for the disabled or boarding and caring for horses is much more a labour of love than a lucrative business venture."

"Many families make sacrifices so they can enjoy time with horses in a rural setting. Most stables are small agri-businesses with very high input costs and narrow profit margins. It is simply not feasible to expect a riding establishment could pass on a commercial taxation rate to their customers and stay in business."
