

Ideas abound for parks

Is nothing sacred?

Are there no properties in Whitchurch-Stouffville protected in their entirety from the menacing tentacles of probing politicians?

Are there no sites where change, even minuscule in magnitude, is not regarded as intrusive, invasive and interfering?

Are there no lands that can, through time and eternity, continue untouched by well-intended human hands?

While history is testament to the fact nothing stays the same, one location should, for all intents and purposes, remain sacrosanct.

That place, let me suggest, is Memorial Park in downtown Stouffville.

True, it has its warts and blemishes. It's not so perfect improvement isn't warranted. But let me warn those who, for whatever reason, would inflict dire changes on this site: be prepared for protests to rival hordes of mosquitoes cavorting through a nudist colony.

It won't be pretty.

These thoughts coursed through my mind as I sat last week amidst a sea of unfamiliar faces at a grassroots workshop in the gym at EastRidge Evangelical Missionary Church. Two points of discussion were central: the potential for Stouffville Memorial Park and possibilities for the new Bethesda Park.

The former includes 57 acres, the latter 51 acres with the likelihood of expansion. A master plan is proposed for both.

This vision session, as it was described, comes under the wing of the leisure services department, with assistance from The Rethink Group consulting firm and Basterfield & Associates landscape architectural advisors, both of Peterborough.

The think-tank introductions were professionally handled with discussions that followed extremely interesting, even intriguing. A wealth of ideas, some practical and some pointless, proliferated the auditorium.

The undertaking is massive, particularly with respect to Memorial Park where heritage and tradition are deeply entrenched. The proposal extends as far as 2026 when, to the surprise of most, population figures are forecast at 62,321.

No secret to all concerned is the fact Park Drive south of Main Street will be extended to Hoover Park, eventually eliminating the water pollution control plant.

The Memorial Park plan takes in the entire park, Lebovic Leisure Centre and library, works depot, recycling centre, the former Town Hall,

Civic Square and Duffin Creek from Main to Hoover Park

Bethesda Park lies east of the Ninth Line and south of Bethesda Road.

For Memorial Park, the following proposals were offered:

- A heritage trail;
- lawn bowling green;
- curling rink site;
- gazebo/bandshell;
- outdoor pool;
- farmers market;
- live theatre;
- improved washrooms;
- toboggan hill;
- improved parking and lighting;

- a public address system;
- refurbished main grandstand;
- a second grandstand;
- sculpture walk;
- community gardens;
- barbecue areas;
- improved ball diamond and tennis court;
- skateboard park;
- additional trees;
- re-located basketball court; and
- several mini-soccer fields.

Two major road changes were recommended: closing Burkholder Street at Franklin Street and blocking Church Street South at the park's memorial gates.

Bethesda Park recommendations include: a toboggan slide, snack bar and washrooms, basketball court, ski trails, picnic areas, fireworks display area, storage facilities, indoor multi-recreation bubble soccer fields, extension of a heritage trail and traffic lights at Bethesda Road and Ninth and Tenth Lines.

It was agreed passive as well as active recreation should be available at Memorial Park.

At Bethesda, most felt the area's rural flavour should be maintained.

Mayor Sue Sherban described the workshop as "a special and important day".

Project director Robert Lockhart called the assignment "very challenging", adding "gradually, we hope to move towards a design that will work for everyone".

Now there's an optimist.
