Thousands of reasonably priced books will be for sale at the Whitchurch-Stouffville Public Library's 16th annual giant book sale.

Kicking off the event is a collector's evening March 30 from 7 to 8 p.m. that draws booksellers and dealers, avid readers and teachers. Admission is \$15 per person.

There is no admission charge for the rest of the sale, which continues to April 3.

There is a wide assortment of adult and children's books in hardcover and paperback. Volunteers are sorting books, videos, records and computer software.

They include the Stouffville Kinsmen, Stouffville Masons, Whitchurch-Stouffville firefighters, Stouffville Lions and students earning community service hours. About 75 volunteers work on the book sale each year, some of them coming back year after year.

Brook's Chocolates will also be available.

Sale hours are from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. March 31 and April 1, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. April 2 and noon to 4 p.m. Sunday.

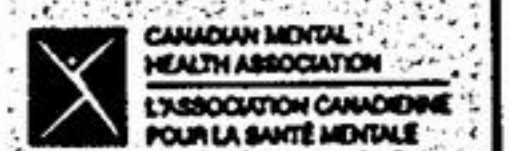
