The Clippers had a good start when Alex McKean scored a hat trick and Hayden Ellison added a goal en route to a 4-0 win over the Markham Waxers.

Ryan Maloney, Nick Robb, Maresa Benacquista and Michael Lennie earned assists.

Facing Caledon in its sec-

ond game, the Clippers came out on the short end of a 4-3 verdict.

Maloney, Lennie and Brendan Clifford did the scoring. Ellison, Robb and Benacquista drew assists.

The Clippers then faced Markham and emerged with a 5-0 win.

Hurricanes put an end to Spirit season

They'd rather be playing Game 7 of their Provincial Jr. A Hockey League North Conference semifinal in Newmarket.

That won't happen, after the Newmarket Hurricanes eliminated the Spirit in six games, capped off by a 4-2 win Tuesday at the Stouffville Arena.

"That series was the story of our year," said Spirit general manager Ken Burrows. "We had lots of chances tonight, but couldn't score. We make three mistakes and they score on all three."

The Spirit scored first, 35 seconds into the game. Ian Brunt got it, with Brandon Tilley, who the Spirit accused of taking cheap shots throughout the series, in the box.

Newmarket would score the next two goals, before Ty Raine tied it, also on the power play, with less than eight minutes left in regulation time.

But Newmarket netted the winner on a sweet passing play three minutes later, then added an empty-netter from Tilley with less than a minute to go.

He curtsied to the crowd of 500 while teammate Matt Whitehead taunted the Spirit bench, swinging his hockey stick like a golf club.

The game was all but over, but not the antics. Spirit tough guy Cory Battista gave a hard elbow to Newmarket's Dan Falbo in the last minute, netting him a five-minute major and wrath of Newmarket players and fans, who attempted to get at him.

Newmarket defenceman Logan Noble fired a slap shot in the direction of the Stouffville bench, and then pointed at the coaching staff. He missed the mark. There was no penalty on the play.

Skirmishes erupted in the dressing rooms corridor and the lobby but ended quickly with York Regional Police in attendance.

Newmarket now meets the Aurora Tigers, who knocked out the Huntsville Muskoka Otters in game 6 Tuesday in Huntsville.

"Experience burnt us in the series," said Burrows, of his much younger roster.

Newmarket can also give Couchiching an assist on that series. We had a very rough six-game series with them in the first round, while Newmarket had a no-hitter (four-game sweep) with Streetsville.

Players gain experience

Sean Gray left a junior hockey dressing room for the final time late Tuesday.

The lone 20-year-old graduate on the Stouffville Spirit roster grabbed his gear, shared a story or two with teammates then shook the hands of team officials, thanking them for his year in Stouffville.

The Pickering resident, called up to the Spirit a year ago in the playoffs from its Jr. C affiliate in Uxbridge, was a warrior on defence this season.

"He has one of the biggest hearts of any kid I've ever coached," Spirit assistant coach Jeff Perrin said.

"What he lacks in talent, he makes up in courage and determination. Just a great kid."

The only 19-year-old on the team, Dan McWhinney, also impressed the staff.

"He is a true No. 1 goalie in this league," said Burrows of the Sault Ste. Marie native.

"He proved it to us," Perrin said. "He's a pressure situation goalie who played very well when we won the Vaughan tournament and in the playoffs."

In contrast, Newmarket, which eliminated the Spirit in the conference semifinal for the second straight season, has eight 20-year-olds and five 19-year-olds on its roster.

"A lot of our kids will be back next season," said Burrows.

"And going through two tough playoff rounds this year will pay dividends down the road."
