# Ozog named Seneca's top athlete



Stephanie Ozog, a pitcher for the Seneca College Sting women's fastball team, was selected as the Toronto school's female athlete of the year for 2004-05.

Sporting a 6-6 regular season won-loss mark in which she fanned 67 batters and recorded a 2.73 earned run average, the 23-year-old Unionville resident established an Ontario Colleges Athletic Association record for innings tossed in a season with 82.

A third-year student majoring in financial services management, Ozog helped her team win the OCAA silver medal as she tossed 26 innings and won two games while losing two, one of which was an 11-0 loss to Durham College in the final.

A graduate of Unionville High School, Ozog's performance in the playoffs enabled her to garner the OCAA championship's most valuable player award, along with a berth on the OCAA.

Ozog said being named the

school's athlete of the year is the highest personal honour she's attained.

"It feels pretty good," she said of earning the award. "This past season was definitely my best ever at the school."

#### **Newmarket GM leaves** for new franchise

The Provincial Jr. A league's Newmarket Hurricanes didn't take long to name a new general manager.

Nor did the search go far.

Unlike the drawn-out process to hire a new coach last off-season that extended into the late stages of the summer, the Hurricanes took only days to elevate director of player personnel Paul Dossey to the position vacated on the weekend by Mike Murrell.

Dossey, who was also general manager for the past four seasons with the Hurricanes Jr. C affiliate Bradford Bulls, becomes the third GM for the Hurricanes in as many seasons.

Team president Anthony Pietramala emphasized the organization's desire to keep the hiring internal and maintain its local connections at all levels.

Murrell announced his resignation Sunday at the team's yearend banquet to accept the general manager and head coach posts with the expansion Seguin Bruins, which will play from Humphrey Arena, near Parry Sound, starting next season.

"I get to really put some fingerprints on this team but I know I have lots of work ahead of me," said the 43-year-old Murrell, who took over as the Hurricanes general manager last May. "I know it's one big steep hill to climb."

The key for Murrell was to add the coaching position to general manager duties. That was not going to happen in Newmarket, where Jim Wells Jr. begins his second season as head coach.

Assistant general manager Greig Baxter, who was also in the running for the Newmarket position, said he will resign.
