## New hotels would fill extended-stay vacancy

Two six-storey hotels will be built at the northeast corner of Hwy. 407 and Woodbine Avenue if Markham council gives the goahead.

Bhulesh Lodhia, a director for developers JM Hospitality Inc. and HDBB Investments Inc., hopes to begin construction of the first hotel, with 101 extended-stay guest rooms, next spring.

"We would like to be open near the end of 2006," Mr. Lodhia said. "The second hotel wouldn't be built for two or three years."

The three-acre site is vacant. The first hotel, fronting on to Bodrington Court, will include a

fitness centre, swimming pool and conference rooms on the ground floor.

An extended-stay room is designed to accommodate a guest for a week or two, Mr. Lodhia said. In addition to a sleeping area and work station, the room has a kitchenette with a stove top, microwave oven, refrigerator and dishwasher.

"There is an absolute need for an extended-stay hotel in

Markham," Mr. Lodhia said. "There are only two hotels in Markham offering extendedstay features."

The second hotel, fronting on to Woodbine Avenue, is designed to have 97 guest rooms, a pool and fitness centre.

While Markham has 10 hotels, the municipality can accommodate more, Darren Ciastko, a senior economic development officer with the town, said.

"The hotels that we have seem to cluster around the Hwy. 404 and Hwy. 407 area, ". Mr. Ciastko said.

"But there has been no hotel development in Markham since 2001 when the two Marriotts, Residence Inn and The Courtyard Inn, were built (in the Hwy 7

and Leslie Street area of Thorn-

Hotels, like most commodities, fit the principles of supply and demand, Mr. Ciastko said.

"The hotel supply is meeting the demand," he said.

Hotels seem to cluster around areas of employment, he said. "More hotels is a sign that employment is growing," Mr. Ciastko said.

"The proposed development is within an industrial and commercial area and not in a location that would impact residential neighborhoods," Jim Baird, Markham's commissioner of development services, said in a report.

Mr. Lodhia's Markham company built the nearby Comfort Inn on Woodbine Avenue in

There are concerns linked to the hotel application, including potential soil contamination and traffic. Both will be studied.

Mr. Lodhia's company has applied for rezoning to accommodate the hotels. Before making a decision, council will host a public meeting. The proposal does fit into the town's official plan.

The appointment came during the recent cabinet shuffle.


"I am honoured to have been chosen by the premier to fulfill this new exciting role in our government," Mr. Wong said.




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
