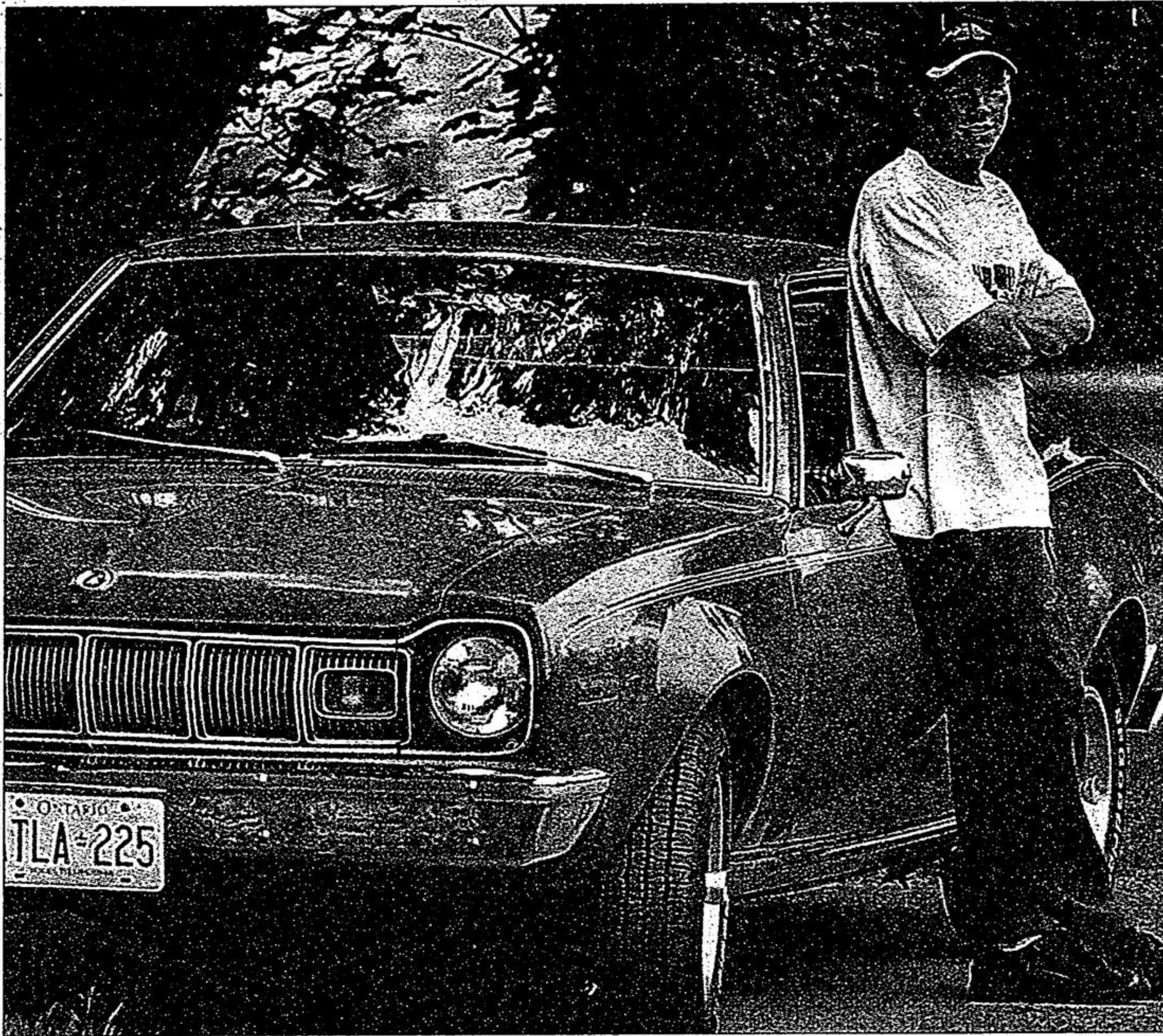


My doctor was originally here, but moved to Markham, eventually retiring. We looked for a female doctor here with no luck. Now we go to a male doctor in Markham.

Classic car buffs gased up for museum's auto show

Bitten by the classic car bug at a young age, 19-year-old Darryl Rae will bring his pride and joy, a 1975 AMC, to the 32nd annual classic and antique car show at the Whitchurch-Stouffville Museum later this month.

The Stouffville resident is fascinated by the history of old cars, calling them "a part of history". For instance, Ramblers were discontinued when American Motors was bought by Daimler Chrysler in the late 1980s.

He acquired his first car, a 1966 Rambler, when he was 16.

Finding parts for older vehicles is often a challenge, but Mr. Rae tinkers around and alters parts to fit. Doing the work on the cars is part of the fun of owning them, he said.

Mr. Rae will join other classic and antique car and hotrod buffs at the Aug. 14 car show, which runs from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the museum grounds at 14732 Woodbine Ave. in Vancor.

Six awards will be presented for the winner and runner-up in the antique, classic and novelty car categories. There are also Drivers' Choice and People's Choice awards.

The first 300 cars to enter the show will receive a commemorative plaque. Pre-registration is not required for the car show.

During the car show, visitors can also speak with costumed interpreters for a glimpse into pioneer life. A variety of foods will be cooked throughout the day in the Brown House kitchen.

An old-fashioned spelling bee is also being organized.

Entertainment on the grounds includes a magician and a rock and blues band from Uxbridge called Hangtime.

Boat crash hurts woman

A peaceful fishing trip turned into tragedy Sunday when Stouffville residents Jane and David Dodds' boat was run over by another boat towing skiers.

Part of the ski boat went over the top of the Dodds' boat, leaving Mrs. Dodds with serious injuries including broken bones. She was lying down in the boat at the time of the collision.

Mrs. Dodds was rushed by ambulance to a hospital in Minden and then airlifted to the Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre in Toronto, where she remains in critical care.

The accident occurred on Salmon Lake, east of Minden.

Mr. Dodds remembers the ski boat coming at them "at a good rate of speed".

He managed to get the boat to shore, where he waited for the ambulance.

About one-third of boating fatalities occur while boaters are fishing, according to statistics from Durham Regional Police.
