

ENCOURAGE CHILDREN TO CHIP IN FOR EXPENSIVE GOODS: MOM

Labels can boost back-to-school spending

While many parents celebrate back to school, they are less enthusiastic about emptying their wallets on clothes and supplies.

Every August, parental pocketbooks get lighter as advertising tells students about all the items they must have for the school year.

Magazines such as Cosmo Girl and Teen Vogue influence teens as to what they should wear to school.

But making sure your child fits in without spending hundreds of dollars is a delicate balance.

Buying clothes second hand may be a start to saving money, according to William Glover, coowner of Once Upon a Child in Newmarket.

"People can still buy something like Bjorn or Gap," Mr. Glover said. "If people can get over the stigma of buying something resale, people can save a lot of money."

But some local parents aren't too keen on the idea of used clothing.

Stopping by Staples in Newmarket in the middle of a Tuesday afternoon, the aisles were crowded with children and their mothers, many of whom came armed with a school-sup-

plied list.

For Holland Landing resident Sue Villeneuve, it's about keeping an eye on flyers for specials to keeps costs down.

"I just check the flyers and see what's on sale and try to see what they need," Ms Villeneuve said.

In the clothes department, the mother of three is hoping to save a little by having her 10 and 12-year-old sons try on handme-downs.

As for a fixation on labels, Ms Villeneuve said her children haven't gone through that phase yet, but said when they want something more expensive than the norm she has a stock answer.

"If I can buy a pair of shorts for \$12 and they want shorts for \$30, then I ask them to chip in the rest and they usually change their mind then," Ms Villeneuve said laughing.

For Newmarket mother Ida Lozowskij, the school's list is her guide.

Ms Lozowskij doesn't mind paying money for items she know will last, but won't spring the extra money just for a specific label.

Although Ms Lozowskij doesn't like to pay high prices for childrens' clothes, she is not keen ongoing to second-hand clothing stores to save money.

Aside from daughter Lina, who is going into Grade 5 in September, wanting new accessories for her locker, Ms Lozowskij doesn't feel too much pressure to buy the must-have gadgets her children see on TV.

As for general tips, parents may start early by taking stock of what their children already have.

Starting early also helps avoid the last-minute shopping spree that can cost parents double what they intended to spend.

Joining forces with other neighbours and families to buy supplies in bulk can also help.
