

# Angus Glen scores high in magazine survey

In the August-September, 2005 issue of ScoreGolf, Canada's golf magazine, the 36-hole Unionville public course earned three honours from its annual Golfers Choice Awards.

Utilizing a regional survey for the first time that distinguished public playing facilities in the Atlantic provinces, Quebec, Ontario, Western Canada and British Columbia, Angus Glen was named the facility in Ontario that provided the Best Service, the Best Halfway House and Best Clubhouse.

In receiving the awards, director of golf Wil Koopmans said the honour course staff wanted the most was the one for best service.

A resident of Markham, Koopmans was quick to note that providing good service has been the club's philosophy since they opened their front gates for business 10 years ago.

It's also been an award the club has garnered from the magazine in prior surveys.

"It's something that we strive to give and care most about," he said. "Obviously the public enjoys what we provide and they must feel that we do it very well."

In earning this award, Koopmans said it can be attributed to a total team effort in which everyone employed by the course played an instrumental role.

Sleepy Hollow is located on the Tenth Line just north of Stouffville.

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
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## STRETCHING IT TO THE LIMIT

Sean Kortschot and Michael Lee split goaltending duties.



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
