



No cash to make transit rapid

Viva stalled without cash from federal, provincial governments

Commuters with visions of getting to work quickly on a Viva bus may be out of luck if provincial and federal politicians don't ante up some cash.

While blue Viva buses have been on York Region roads since September, a crucial part of the rapid transit system is having separate lanes for buses to avoid congestion on regional roads.

"We want to provide a real alternative to the car. If Viva is stuck in traffic like a car, it's not a real alternative," Mary-Frances Turner, vice-president of the region's transit corporation, said.

That plan is on hold until the region sees some money.

"We've been after funding for a year from both the provincial and federal governments," Ms Turner explained, adding neither tier of government made an official commitment. "We have asked kindly for funding support."

Two of the major changes to the system planned in the \$1.6-billion second phase of the project are separate busways and an operations and maintenance centre in middle of the region. But \$7.3 million is needed from the provincial and federal governments to get the preliminary planning and engineering under way.
