

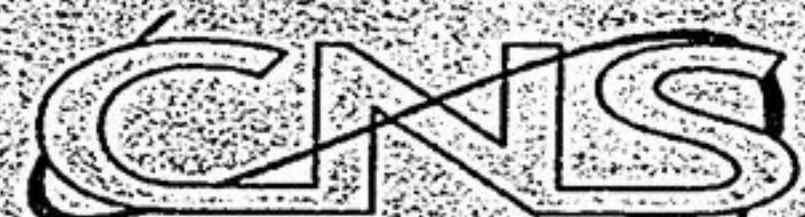
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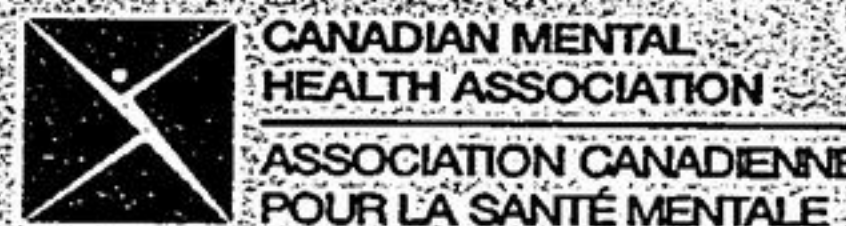
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# Questionnaire on way to mailboxes, PCs

Count yourself in over the next 10 days.

The 2006 Census questions are being made available by mail, hand and online, while Canadians are being reminded they're legally bound to answer questions that could be linked to age, marital status, education, employment, income and ethnic origin.

By May 16, households and agricultural operations should have received census forms.

About 70 per cent of the questionnaires will arrive by mail, while the rest will be delivered by enumerators.

As well, households will, for the first time, have the opportunity to complete a census online at [www.census2006.ca](http://www.census2006.ca), according to Keri Jordan, a Statistics Canada public communications officer.

"It's an easy, secure and convenient option that can be used anywhere, any time," Ms Jordan said. The goal is to count every man, woman and child in Canada.

One in five households will receive a long questionnaire, made up of 60 questions, while all others will get an eight question version. It's estimated 12 million households will receive a questionnaire as part of the nationwide 2006 Census of Population and Agriculture.

During the past month, municipal officials across York Region joined Ivan Fellegi, Canada's chief statistician, to encourage residents to wel-

come the census. People are being asked many questions, including those linked to language, employment and education.

"By law, Statistics Canada must take a census every five years and every household must fill in a census form," Mr. Fellegi said.

"Statistics Canada protects, absolutely, the confidentiality of your information. No one outside Statistics Canada has access to your personal information without your consent."

The census helps paint a picture of who we are as a nation and the communities in which we live.

Census information is used by community groups, businesses and governments to develop plans for education and training, new products and services, housing, health care and other programs, Mr. Fellegi said.

Governments of all levels use the data to make policy decisions about our economic and social programs.

"Data collected provides a detailed picture of the demographic, social and economic conditions of the population of the country at a single point in time," Ms Jordan said. "Census data is used to plan important services such as transportation, health care, education and fire and police protection, all a part of our daily lives."
