customers," he said.

The new Nofrills will have an extensive selection of hot meals for takeout, a 'dollar store' area, bakery and an expanded health and beauty section.

Mr. Balsdon doesn't foresee a pharmacy in the new store, noting there are a number already in town.

He anticipates that Wal-Mart and the regional shopping centre will bring shoppers from northern Markham into town.

The Anderson property development and an adjacent residential subdivision are on about 30 acres. Retail and commercial space will cover about 330,000 square feet.

Ringwood Drive is to be extended north of Main Street to the west of the shopping centre. The road will eventually connect to Millard Street.

The town hasn't received the site plan for the new store, Tom Parry, the town's director of development services said.

The municipality has no rules about how many grocery stores are allowed in town. Rather, its job is to make sure there's enough commercial space so

businesses can move into town to support the residential subdivisions, he said. "This is a business decision of Loblaws," Mr. Parry said.

Helene Johnson, president and CEO of the Whitchurch-Stouffville Chamber of Commerce, noted that large corpora-

tions usually "do homework" and carefully assess an area before opening their stores. Having a larger grocery store will benefit residents, she noted.

However, a grocery store is needed in the east end of town, Mrs. Johnson added, especially with the increase in the number of residential developments in that area.

Stouffville's other grocery stores, A&P and Sobeys, are also located on Main Street in the west end.

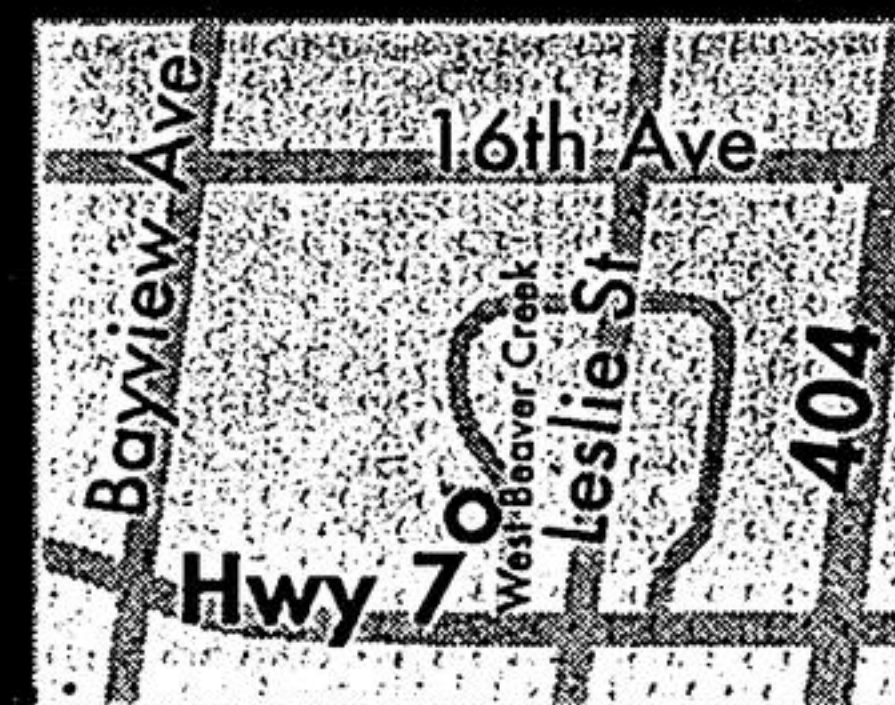
