

Firing 'shocked' Spirit coach

'Want someone to develop kids,' owner says

Dan West thought directing the Stouffville Spirit to a Provincial Junior A Hockey League North-West Conference title last season and reaching the North Conference final this past season should have warranted his return next season.

He was wrong.

Just after the club had its annual team photo session Tuesday evening, Spirit owners Zeev Werek and Dave Laren informed West his contract would not be renewed next season.

"I was shocked; to put it in better words, I didn't see it coming at all," West said. "I thought we did a good job for two years. I guess they (Werek and Laren) wanted to go in a different direction."

West said he wasn't given a clear reason why he was let go, but speculates it might have to do with both owners sons being on the Spirit roster next season.

"They might not see me as being the right guy for that," West said.

Although disappointed, West said he has fond memories of his two seasons in Stouffville.

"We played a lot of hockey and I had a chance to meet a lot of great people and work with a lot of great people, guys (such as) Ken Burrows (Spirit general manager)," he said.

"It was definitely fun to be part of watching great players (such as) Will Acton, Corey Trivino and Randy Johnston become better players and to have a hand in their progress," West said.

He said he has received several calls from players and parents since the news broke of his firing.

The future?

"I think I'll sit tight for a week or two and pursue some other job. I know there are openings around the league and I'll check the OHL and try to get my name out there to see if I might be able to be an assistant coach at that level," he said.

"I think I'll bounce back somewhere along the line."

And the Spirit?

"They've got a good group of players coming back," he said. "I told the guys after we lost to Aurora (in the North Conference final) that Aurora was built for this year. But we're still growing and we

hope to be champs next year. They've got a good base to succeed next year."

The decision was not made hastily and had nothing to do with the team's record or personality conflicts, Werek said. The owners wanted a coach that would be more visible in the community.

"It was a difficult decision not to bring Dan back," Werek said. "Dan is a real gentleman who knows the game inside and out. I'm certain he will find a job quickly. We would highly recommend him."

"But we just looked at what we needed in the future

and what we wanted to see was someone to develop kids and have them more community minded. Therefore, we thought we needed a coach who could spend that time in the community. With Dan recently getting married and living in Lindsay it would be quite a trek for him to do that."

The search for a successor is underway and the new coach could be in place in 10 days.

The club's annual rookie camp goes May 6 and 7 at the Stouffville Arena.

"We have two or three individuals on our short list now that are excellent and fit what we want to do," he said. "We just want to make sure we don't go through what we're currently going through."

Winless last season, tykes take U.S. event

Daryl May remembers his Stouffville Clipper tyke select hockey players failing to win a game during the regular season as mites last year.

This season has been a totally different story for May's contingent of players, aged seven and eight. In York Simcoe league play, the Clippers finished fourth out of eight teams.

Relegated to the consolation round of the playoffs, after losing their first-round series, the Clippers eliminated Markham and Clarington and are in the best-of-five final against Aurora.

But that's not all.

Travelling to Buffalo, N.Y., earlier this month for the Pepsi Hockey Invitational, the Clippers skated off with the Little NHL Pacific Select Division crown. They won 7-3 over the Brampton Battalion Seconds in the final.

Luke Sear ignited the Clippers' attack in the finale with three goals while Steele Rodin added two goals, Vaughan McCusker one goal and two assists and Connor May one goal, one assist. Gerrit Tiemersma, Austin Meiliunas and Rhys Barker collected assists.

To reach the final, the Clippers defeated the Buffalo Regals 9-2, Grimsby Super 7s 8-0 and Brampton Battalion 5-2.

May, the brother of veteran NHLer Brad May, attributes the turnaround to several factors.

"We've got a good group of kids to start with," he said. "It's all about confidence and putting the kids in the right places. Right now, any of our lines can be competitive."

Other team members are: Adrian Addante, who recorded his second shutout of the season against Grimsby, defencemen Camryn Tait, Matthew Hunt and Timothy Barker and forwards Zachary Roberts, Kyle Kiricai, Jackson Mistelbacher, Chris Gilmour, Kieran Beaudoin and Miller Boothby.

May was assisted on the bench by Steve McCusker and Greg Roberts, brother of Pittsburgh Penguin Gary Roberts.

Jay Meiliunas is trainer and Tamara Meiliunas manager for the club sponsored by Shoeless Joe's, Global Pet Foods and Farmer Jacks.

The Clippers and Aurora opened their consolation final series with a 1-1 tie Wednesday.

The remainder of the series includes dates: Monday at the Aurora Community Centre, 6 p.m.; Wednesday in Stouffville, 6:10 p.m.

If required, the series would return to Aurora Thursday at 6 p.m. and Stouffville next Saturday at 6:10 p.m.
