Kart racer trains for BMW series

With the kart racing season about to begin, Mike Vincec is ready to tackle a bigger challenge after signing a development contract with Jensen MotorSport through 2008.

As the reigning Canadian National ICC champion, Stars of Karting's 2006 rookie of the year and Ekartingnews' 2006 Rising Star, the 15-year-old Stouffville resident's deal includes training and testing to prepare for competition in the Formula BMW USA series.

While Vincec carried out some off-season testing with Toronto-based Jensen MotorSport, team principal Eric

Jensen was impressed with the youngster's ability to quickly adapt to the FB02.

Vincec will continue to compete in karts through 2007 for Cameron Motorsports driving the CMI/CRG/Swede-Tech in ICC. The schedule includes competition in the Sunoco Ron Fellows Karting Championship and the Snap On Stars Of Karting series.

Both series leave plenty of time for testing with Jensen in the Formula BMW. It is also the plan of Jensen MotorSport to enter a car for Mike in several races on the 2007 Formula BMW USA schedule, including the Montreal Grand Prix event in June in support of the Formula One cars.

Vincec's next event is April 13 to 15 for the Stars of Karting Race of the Americas in Norman, Oklahoma.

Juveniles second in OMHA final

The Stouffville juvenile Clippers possessed plenty of heart and desire when

they faced Windsor in the Ontario Minor Hockey Association A championship final.

But in the end, it wasn't quite enough as Windsor claimed the best-of-five series in four games last weekend in Windsor after defeating the Clippers 4-0 Friday and 4-2 in Saturday's finale.

Josh Spang had a goal and one assist in the final game while Landon Wideman added the other goal.

"We didn't quite do what we had hoped to do," coach Brent Gibson said.

"Windsor was that much better than us. They had a good, solid team.

"But give our guys credit. They were all heart. They were banged, bruise and sore. I thought we had them scared, but we just didn't have enough in the tank."

Gibson also thought the Windsor squad, which had moved into the A division level after being in AAA last year, had a bit more maturity.

Despite settling for the silver medal, Gibson called the season rewarding, especially for those who could return next season as the team will lose five players to age eligibility.

"For the younger guys on this team, they got a taste of what going to the finals was all about and might want to come back."

Gibson said he would like to return behind the bench if the executive wants him back.

If you were involved in an adoption that is registered in Ontario, you should know that access to identifying information for adopted adults and birth parents is changing. Changes to adoption information laws in Ontario will allow most adopted adults and birth parents to receive identifying information from original birth registrations and adoption orders.

Changes also include the ability to register a no-contact notice and apply for an order prohibiting the disclosure of identifying information in order to prevent harm. In the past, non-identifying information may have been disclosed to adopted people or birth relatives.
