

Spirit wins opener, barely

You won't hear any complaints from Stouffville Spirit head coach Dave D'Ammizio after his club's 4-3 victory over the Collingwood Blues in Thursday's Provincial Junior A Hockey League regular season opener at the Stouffville Arena.

But he hopes his players learned something for games yesterday in Collingwood and tomorrow in Newmarket.

Inconsistent play from the Spirit helped the Blues claw back from a 4-1 deficit.

Were it not for a timely save by Spirit netminder Trevor O'Neill before time expired, the contest was headed into overtime and possibly a shootout.

The Spirit outshot the Blues 32-24.

"We were a little scramby," D'Ammizio said. "When you go 8-0 in the preseason and everything goes your way and you're not facing adversity that's one thing. But I think on Thursday the guys were brought back to reality. Maybe some of the guys had those opening night jitters and when we were up in the game we might have let up a bit."

"I'd call it an ugly win."

Igniting the Spirit offence was the veteran line of Corey Trivino, Mark Sullivan and Randy Johnston. Johnston scored twice while Sullivan contributed a goal and one helper and Trivino three assists. Donivan Munro added the other Spirit marker.

Veteran defenceman Daniel Spivak incurred an upper body injury and will be out for at least one week.

"When we needed to create some offence we did when we used our speed and skill. When we did that I thought we dominated," said D'Ammizio.

"But when the chips were down our kids were composed."

The Blues, whose new general manager is ex-Spirit GM Ken Burrows, were tough.

"They're a physical team and tried to take some liberties with some of our new players. But they
