 Mr. and Mrs. Earl Doner were guests at the golden wedding celebration of Mr. and Mrs. George French. Congratulations to the bride and groom.

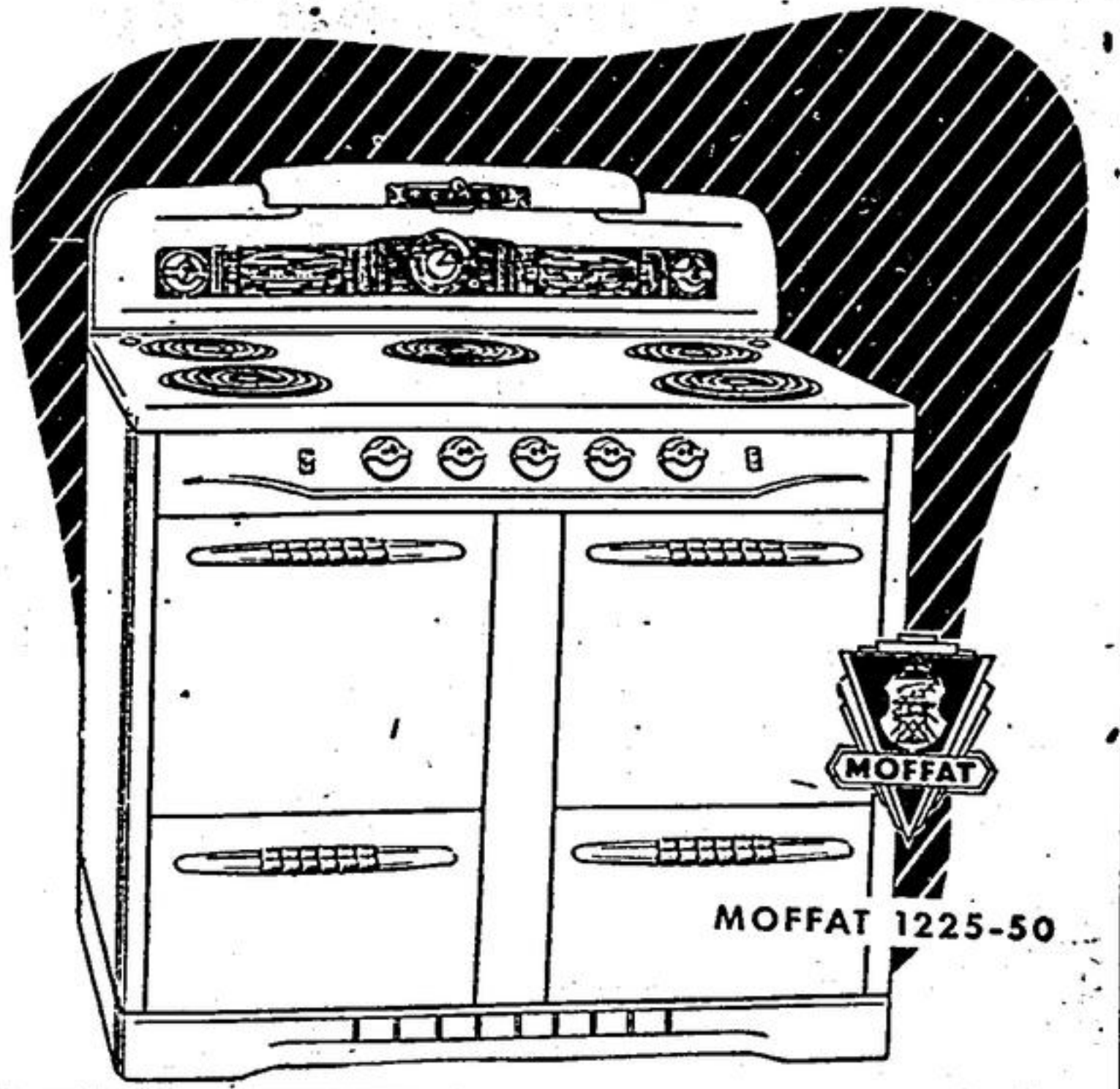
