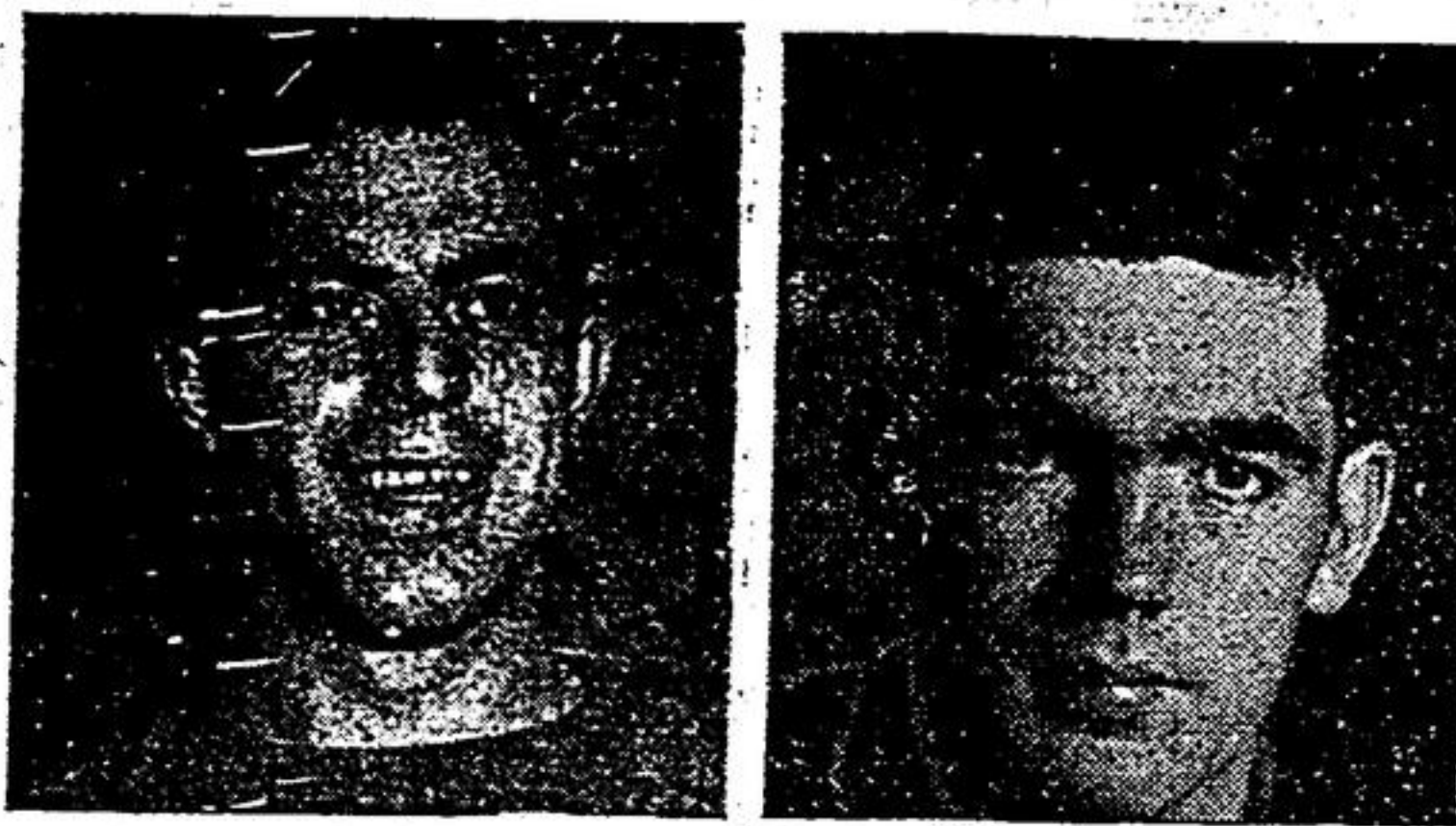

Rhodes Selected Most Valuable Player, Lewis Teammates' Second Choice



Following the game on Tuesday night at Oshawa, the local club took a vote by ballot to pick the most valuable man to his team during the season and also the runner-up. Goalie Jack Rhodes was selected as the top performer with centreman Gord Lewis coming in a close second. Jack has put on a great goaltending display throughout the entire season and held up equally well during the playoffs just concluded. The popular goalie is highly respected by his teammates and his good humour, fun-loving manner can always be counted on even when the team may be down a few goals. Gord Lewis, effective centreman, placed

second in the selection. Galand will be remembered by local hockey fans as the speedy winger with the Millionaires this season. The Markham club are currently looking for a replacement for the hockey and baseball star. Galand gained fame as a pitcher with the Peter Pan club in Toronto.

Efforts are being made by George Panter, O.H.A. business manager, to obtain a series in next year's Major Series from Syracuse, N.Y., which seems to be getting pretty far afield. Buffalo was also approached, but didn't have enough dates left in its arena to handle a Major Series entry. 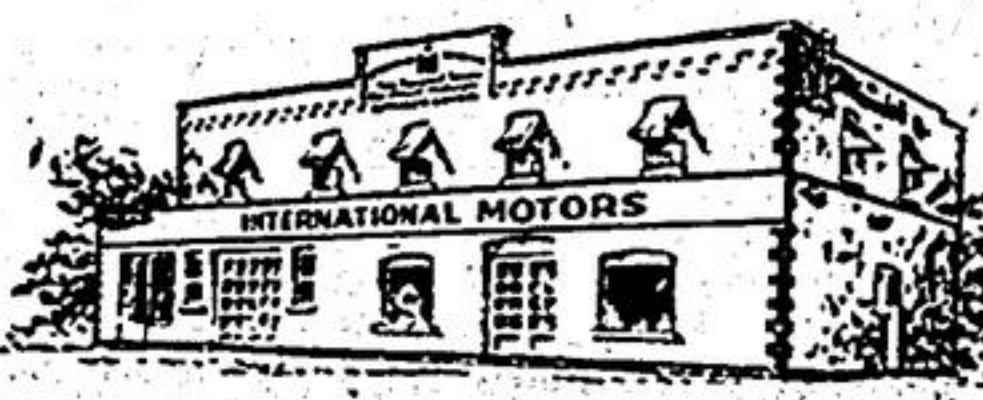
