### Junior Farmers Achievement Day Saturday, May 26th

The directors of the York County Junior Farmers' Association at their recent meeting decided to again hold the Achievement Day program for the girls' club in the Newmarket Town Hall on Saturday, May 26th, but are planning to hold their livestock judging competition on the same day in the Richmond Hill district. For a great many years this contest was held in the general vicinity of Richmond Hill but in recent years it has centred around Newmarket. With the kind co-operation of the breeders this is always a very worthwhile day for the juniors. The junior farmers will register at Don Head Farms at 8.30 d.s.t. where they will judge their first classes and proceed from there to the other farms to be visited. In all, it is planned to judge two classes each of dairy, beef, sheep, swine and horses and then give reasons on their placings for one class of each at the Agricultural Office. The judging itinerary is being worked out by E. K. Pearson, Assistant Agricultural Representative, Newmarket. In the evening the boys' and girls' groups will hold their annual banquet in the King George Hotel, Newmarket, where the final results will be announced and the trophies and special prizes presented including two trips to the U.S.A.

### General Expenses Bump Markham Twp. Tax Rate Three Mills

(Continued from Front Page) School Area requisition is higher, being 3.3 mills as against 1.3 last year, for a levy of \$11,700.48. A representative of the Langstaff Ratepayers appeared before council with requests for repairs to Church St., speeding restrictions, and a completion of the garbage collection arrangements. In connection with the latter request, council did not feel that they could wait any longer for a decision from the ratepayers as to the method of collection. It appeared some of the ratepayers were objecting to using the assessment system for arriving at the cost per household of this service. Mr. H. Morrison, 4th con., near Victoria Square, waited on council concerning a new sub-division which council approved some time ago, and which has now been tabled for further consideration since the health requirements call for lots of a total area of 15,000 square feet rather than 12,000 as formerly approved on the plan. The restrictions also stipulate that one dwelling only may be erected on each lot. "I don't think we need to upset this plan now when we approved of it before, you'll soon want to make the lots so big a man will need a tractor to work it," commented Councillor Hooper. However, the balance of council felt that the restrictions should be adhered to for public health safety.
