## Clean Farm Contest Wages War on Weeds

Begun in a small way five years ago, the Ontario County Junior Farmer "Clean Farm Contest" has now grown to embrace organizations at Brooklin, Port Perry, Uxbridge and Beaverton and 84 boys are participating this year.

Ryerson Beare, Greenbank, County Weed Inspector and foremost authority on weeds in this district will be the judge. Already he has visited each contestant's home with pointers on the contest and each has been furnished free with an amount of 2, 4-D with which to start the battle.

There are two reasons for introducing this project at this time: During the last few years, the weed problem has been neglected. A new system of weed control, with County inspectors and many revisions to the Weed Act, will be in force this year.

The "Clean Farm Contest" has been approved by the Provincial Farmers' Association and the Ontario Department of Agriculture and will be right in line with the new weed control program.

The contest is confined to weed control only. It is open only to members of associations affiliated with the Ontario Junior Farmers' Association. An entry fee is optional.

The contest will run from June 1st, 1951, to October, 1951. Awards will be made on the basis of farms showing the greatest improvement in weed control during this period.

The Ontario Department of Agriculture will provide \$75 as prize money. Twenty-five dollars additional prize money will be provided locally.

Farms eligible for the competition must be at least 50 acres in size. The home farm only may be considered. Bush and swamp land shall not be included.

**Basis of Scoring** Farms will be scored on a basis of 500 points. Actual Possible Score

Crop area including hay and grain crops, pasture, truck crops, and summer fallow ..... 250

Home garden, orchard, farm and home yard, front lane and roadside in front of farm ..... 100

Fence rows, fence corners, back laneway and ditches ..... 100

Efficient use of herbicides and sprayers in weed and brush control ..... 50

Total ..... 500
