CHILDREN FIVE AND FOUR BID TO CONQUER CHANNEL TURNED DOWN

The Tongay children from Florida had their names flashed across the headlines of the newspapers in the United States, Canada and Britain as the two youngsters, Bubba 5, and Kathy 4, claimed they would make a bid to swim the English Channel. The British Government, however, had

different ideas and on Friday the two were sent home. The attempted swim was planned for some time in mid August. The two children have been swimming since they were barely a year old. The older of the two Bubba swam 22 miles down the Mississippi last year while his sister swam five miles. The British Government said they didn't like the idea of commercializing the event.

Has 10 Days To Pay \$50 Fine, Dog Cruelty

Still maintaining she was not guilty of ill-treating her dogs, Mrs. M. H. Page was fined \$50 or one month in the county jail on a cruelty charge.

The gray-haired Toronto dog breeder, who, in evidence, had been represented as virtually penniless, was given ten days to pay the fine. She may have to sell some of the dogs to do it.

Magistrate Frank Ebbs told the Kennel Club members he frankly doubted her statement that she had paid daily visits to the 63 dogs she kept for more than a month in a Pickering township barn.

"If she had visited them every day and stayed as long as she said she did these dogs wouldn't have been found in such condition as the Humane Society inspectors say they found there," the Magistrate said.

"I have come to the conclusion these dogs were not being given the necessary proper treatment, and mainly because Mrs. Page didn't have the necessary means."

Mrs. Page took the conviction without further protest than to say "I still maintain I'm not guilty, your worship."

But there was a momentary flurry of excitement in the court when a woman named Virginia Stewart tried to present a document to the Magistrate.

Miss Stewart marched up to the bench and thrust toward the magistrate a letter—drafted before the conviction had even been registered—from John Cameron, director of the so-called Camerism Society in Toronto. The society dedicated to prevention of cruelty and to campaigning against vivisection, had decided Mrs. Page's sentence was too light.

"You've nothing to do with this case," thundered Magistrate Ebbs as Miss Stewart pushed the letter at him. "What you've done comes very close to contempt of court."

He ordered the woman to remove herself and her letter from the courtroom.

Humane Society inspectors had testified that 20 of the 63 dogs were in crates, the rest in stalls. There was a "strong stench" in the barn, and the dogs hadn't looked as if they'd been properly watered or fed for some time.

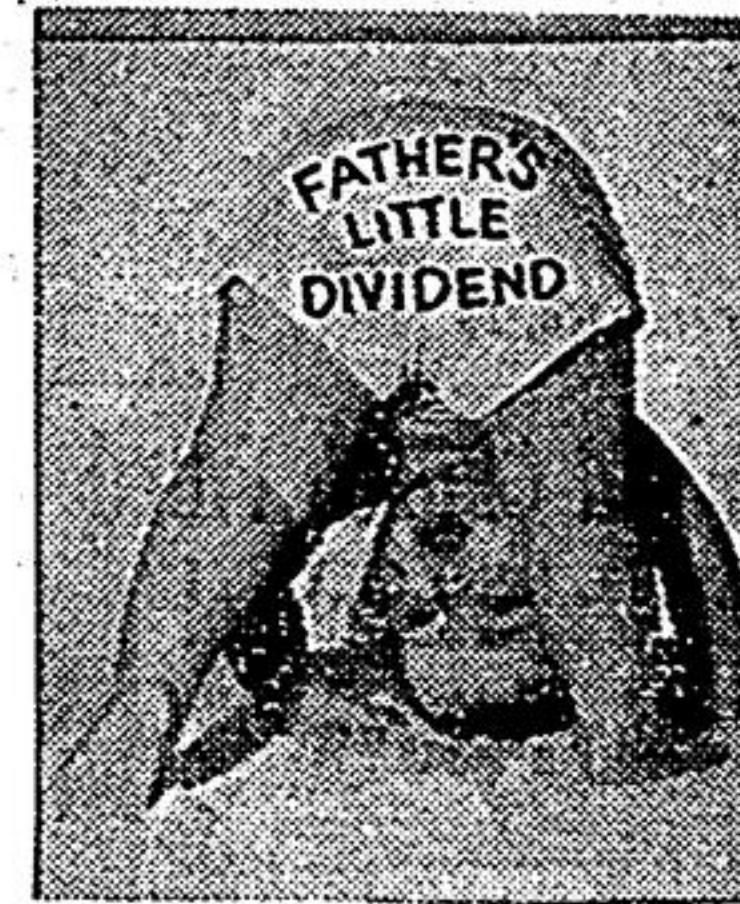
Man, 24, Shoots Self As Woman Watches

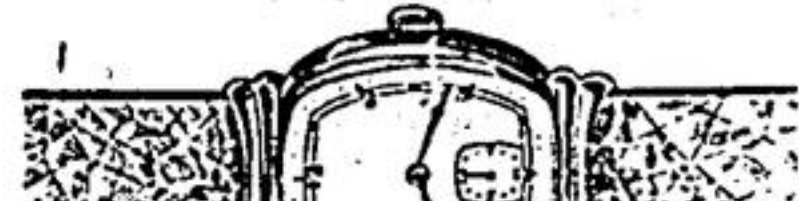
