SCHOOL'S OUT - WATCH OUT

Drive with Extra Caution

Last week several hundred school children were released to roam here in Stouffville for the summer holidays.

Most child pedestrian injuries, it is stated, happen to youngsters in the 5-9 age group, and most bicycle injuries to those 10-14. Here's a slogan, "This Summer Make Safety a Habit," and six simple safety rules for children, and six for motorists.

FOR CHILDREN

1. Play in safe places off the roads.
2. Walk on the left side of the road (if there is no foot-path).
3. Stop, look, and wait before you cross any road.
4. Be easy to see; stay clear of parked cars; at night, wear or carry something white.
5. On Bicycles, remember: good riders take no chances.
6. In cars, help - don't bother the driver.

FOR MOTORISTS

1. On trips, start early to avoid hurry and confusion.
2. Take it easy; speed and hurry cause many accidents.
3. The "right of way" at an intersection is no excuse for careless driving.
4. Expect unpredictable moves when you see children on foot or on bicycles.
5. Children inside your car are extra reasons for caution.
6. Signs, signals, and "rules of the road" are for your safety. Obey them.
