Pickering Asks Government To Take Over School Costs

A proposal calling for the Provincial Government to assume full responsibility for educational costs in Ontario and presented to Ontario County Council by East Whitby Township recently was endorsed and recommended by Pickering Council at their regular meeting last week.

The motion, tendered by Deputy-Reeve Dr. Neil McEwan also stipulated that the Provincial Government take over responsibility of financing new school buildings throughout the Province. The fact that the Government has larger sources of revenue than are available to municipal councils and that a great burden would be lifted from real estate if municipal school levies were removed from the annual tax rates was cited as the basic reason for presenting such a motion.

Reeve W. W. Westney warned that under such a scheme the municipality would lose control of all

educational institutions within their township boundaries. "If the Government takes over the financial responsibility they will certainly take over full control," said the Reeve.

"This council has no control now!" the Deputy-Reeve cried. "The Government tells us what plans we must follow in building new schools. They tell us where to build these schools. They tell us what type of desks to install. They tell us what to pay our teachers, so what control could we lose?"

"We sit here like a bunch of stuffed pigeons," Dr. McEwan continued. "We have no say, but we do have the bills to pay. Actually this council hasn't the authority to do one thing. We pay fifty per cent of the costs while the Government retains 100 per cent of the control. I say we have nothing to lose by asking that the Government assume full responsibility for our educational system."

The death of Mrs. Fred Pugh on Saturday, July 7th, removed a lifelong resident of the Claremont district. Mrs. Pugh who was in her 74th year, had been in ill health for only a few months when the end came at the family home on Main Street.

In 1904 she married Fred Pugh, and for some years the couple farmed on the 8th con. of Pickering, later moving into retirement in the village. The late Mrs. Pugh was a member of the United Church. She had a most pleasant and friendly personality, and was an ardent horticulturalist.

Besides her husband, she is survived by one son, Lloyd, on the home farm, 8th con., one brother Lyman Pilkey who makes his home with the Pughs, three sisters, Mrs. A. Mantle and Miss J. Pilkey, Claremont, and Mrs. T. B. Whiting, Strathroy. There are two grandchildren.

The funeral on Tuesday afternoon was conducted from the late home with public service in the United Church conducted by the family pastor, Rev. H. Lackey. Six nephews acted as pallbearers, and interment was made in the Claremont Union Cemetery.

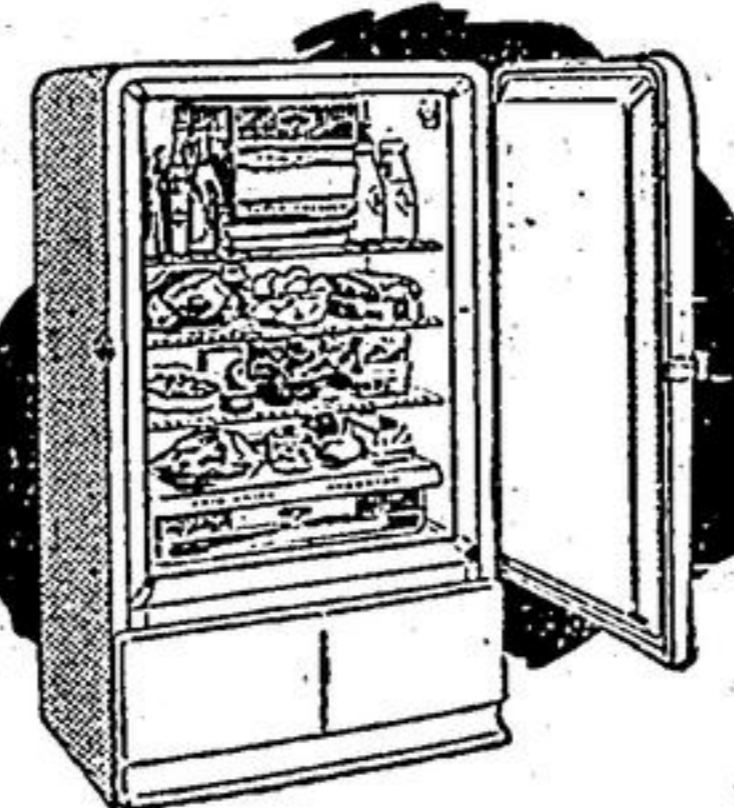
