## 50 Years Wed At Pickering

Mr. and Mrs. William Turner of Old Forest Rd., Pickering, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary at their home recently. With them for the occasion were their two sons, Thomas James Turner, Toronto, and Rev. Albert J. Turner, Detroit. They also have a daughter, Mrs. Annie Duncan, Belfast, Ireland. Their son, Rev. William Henry Turner, a Baptist chaplain, was killed in the South Pacific in the Second World War. They have 10 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Mr. Turner was born in 1877 in Cabra, Aghnacloy, County Tyrone, Ireland, and Mrs. Turner in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1879. Mr. Turner was raised on the farm and later became an itinerant evangelist, preaching in school houses, tents and country churches. Crossing the Irish Sea in the interests of his work he met his future wife, the former Marion Ferguson, organist of Paisley Rd. Baptist Church, Glasgow, and an active church worker. They were married in Glasgow by Rev. John Harper, well known preacher of the day who later lost his life in the Titanic disaster. They came to Canada in 1929, living in Toronto until two years ago, when they moved to Pickering.
