Owners Outnumber Tenants Three to One in Whitchurch Twp.

A recent survey of building in Whitchurch Township reveals that home owners outnumber tenants almost three to one. According to the assessors figures there were 1,671 homes in the municipality at the beginning of this year, seventy of these being constructed during the year. Of these, 1,230 are occupied by the owner and 441 by tenants. The total population at that time stood at 4,641.

Bass Harvesting In Full Swing

Bass harvesting from over-stocked waters is now in full swing the Fish and Wildlife Division of the Dept. of Lands and Forests announces.

The Department has, for several years, been removing small-mouth black bass from waters in the Province where these are exceptionally abundant, but slow growing, and transporting them to waters where angling has shown a low yield.

At present, hatchery personnel are working in lakes in eastern Ontario where over population of bass has been determined and are removing surplus fish to suitable adjacent water re-stocking.

The bass being taken from these over-populated waters average 8 to 9 inches, just under the legal size, and their growth is slow due partly to an inadequate food supply. When introduced into other suitable waters where the fish population is less congested their development is more rapid and reproduction is assured.
