

Ford Co. To Build Giant New Plant Near Oakville



As a result of negotiations with the Ford Motor Co. of Canada, W. S. Hall of Oakville, Ont., seen with three grandchildren, sold his 140-acre poultry-dairy farm for \$150,000. Two houses, valued at \$25,000, were not included in the transaction and will be moved to another section of land. Ford has been buying up land in Toronto and Hamilton districts for erection of a giant new automobile factory.

C.R.U. Buying Tarp For Football Final

The Canadian Rugby Union stands ready to battle the weather for any future Grey Cup game.

The C.R.U., mindful of the outcry over the sorry condition of the Varsity Stadium gridiron after a snow and rainstorm on the eve of last year's east-west football final, has ordered a tarpaulin costing \$11,500 to cover the field. It hopes now that this action and the plan they are working on to improve the sale of its 3-per cent share of Grey Cup ticket will result in kinder words in the future.

The C.R.U. announced after a closed executive meeting Saturday that a three-man committee will go into the ticket problem and that the tarpaulin would be used "exclusively" for the Grey Cup game.

Later T. H. C. Allison, past president of the C.R.U. and acting secretary since the death of Percy Robinson clarified the announcement about the tarpaulin. He said the senior leagues—the Big Four, Western Canada, Intercollegiate and Ontario Union—would be able to obtain use of the tarpaulin providing they were willing to pay a rental fee and any other expenses.

The committee named to iron out ticket difficulties will meet in Toronto, Oct. 12 and also arrange final details of the Grey Cup game on November 24th.
