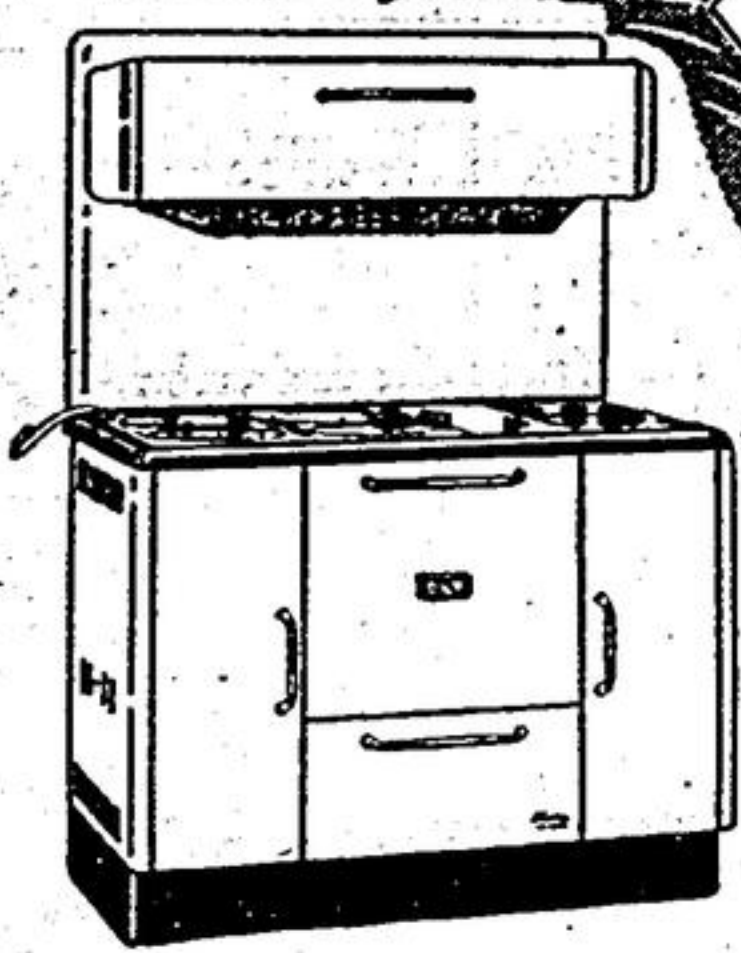

Wife, Friends Keep Arsonist Out of Jail

A Markham Township man who set fire to the home twice last month "because of financial pressure" was saved from jail by the evidence of his wife and seven friends on Friday.

Donald McKinnon, 25, was convicted on two charges of arson in Willowdale court and was given suspended sentence on each count by Magistrate Hollinrake.

McKinnon set fire to his home on Sept. 22, but the blaze went out. On Sept. 23 he told police a weird tale of being bound and struck by two unknown men who then set fire to his home. Insp. R. J. Simmons said \$10,000 insurance was carried on the dwelling.

McKinnon had seven character witnesses. His wife testified that their home would be broken up if her husband, father of three children, went to jail.

Man Dies While Driving to Funeral

David S. Byer, 64, died on his way to a funeral in Markham last week. Feeling a heart attack coming on, he pulled his car into a sideroad, ran into a ditch and slumped over the wheel. He was on his way to the funeral of his son-in-law's mother, Mrs. Levina Housser.

After working in Vineland for the past 30 years as a fruit-grower, plumber and tinsmith, Mr. Byer had just sold his farm preparatory to moving to Fenelon Falls.

David F. Byer Buried In Markham Township

Ailing for some fifteen years, David F. Byer passed away enroute to Markham on Wednesday of last week. Mr. Byer was in his 65th year, and had been a resident of Vineland for thirty-two years. Deceased was born in Stayner.

Forty-three years ago he married Martha M. Lehman who survives him. During his lifetime in addition to residing in Stayner and Vineland, the late Mr. Byer also made his home on the 8th con. of Markham near Mt. Joy. He was identified with the Wideman Menonite Church.

Surviving are one daughter, Agnes (Mrs. Jos. Housser), Stouffville, a brother Benjamin, Copper Mt., B.C. and a sister Hannah (Mrs. Neidrauer), Buffalo.

The funeral on Sunday was conducted from the Wignall Funeral Home, Markham, with service at the Wideman Church conducted by Aaron Grove and Mr. Schalback, Vineland. Pallbearers were Edwin Byer, Walter Byer, Jacob Shank, Oliver Shank, Lorne Byer and Earle Byer.

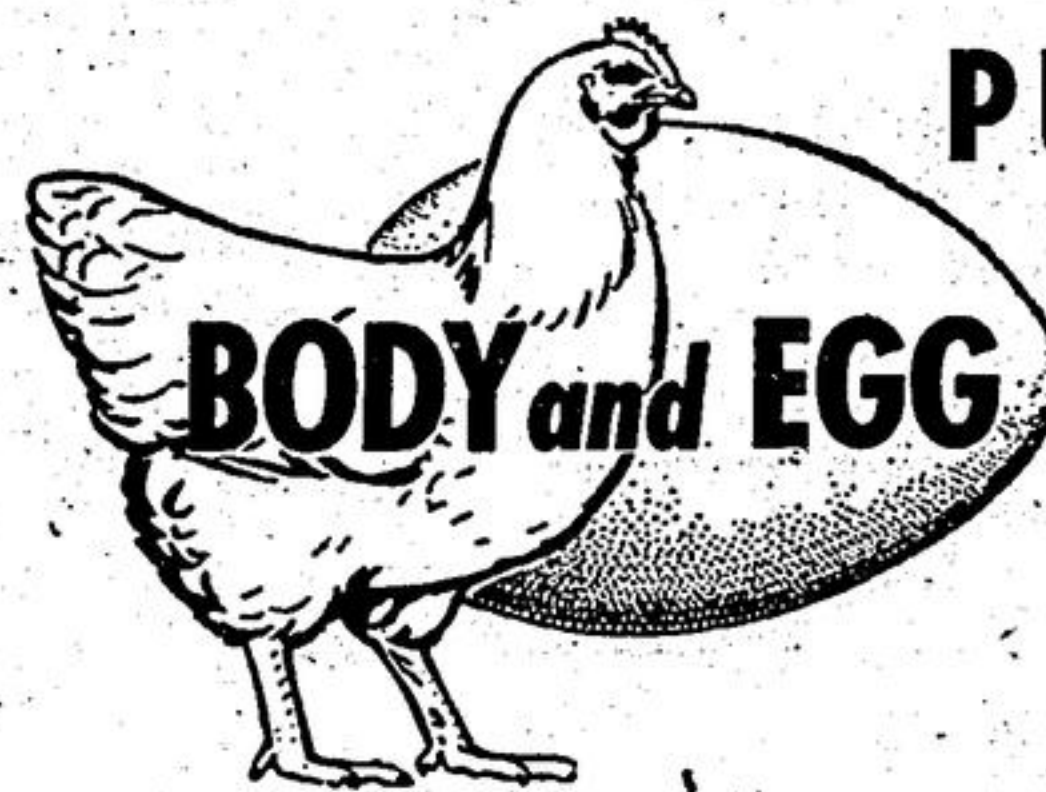
