

Twp. Council Occupied by "Planning Board" Business

The regular session of Markham Township Council on Monday evening was principally occupied by business which in most municipalities is handled by an independent Planning Board. Most controversial of the planning questions which came before council was that concerning a forty-acre parcel of land lying along the C.N.R. right-of-way adjacent to Richmond Hill.

Mr. R. Fenn who appeared with the proposed plan for division of this land into five-acre lots for industrial purposes stated that he had received the permission of council to proceed providing health and engineer officials were satisfied as to streets and drainage. However the question arose as to the type of industry that might be established, and a lengthy argument ensued over this point.

Mr. Fenn told the board that he wished an immediate okay that a lumber business and a construction firm could go ahead with the purchase of land in this area.

It was pointed out that a delegation of ratepayers had recently approached council, concerned with whether or not some objectionable industry might locate here.

A bylaw designating the area as industrial only covers a portion of Mr. Fenn's land.

"We should extend the restricting bylaw to cover the whole of this area," stated Councillor Clark. "We approved this man's plan before, I don't see why we should

be holding it up now," commented Councillor Hooper.

"Will you or will you not give permission for this lumber business and construction firm to purchase?" asked Mr. Fenn.

"We only get peanuts out of businesses like that," replied Councillor James.

"If they won't put up the proper type of buildings we want then they can go elsewhere," stated Councillor Clark.

"We're just sitting on the fence on this thing we've okayed the plan and now we're hedging on it," returned Councillor Hooper.

A resolution was finally passed approving the proposed subdivision of lot 6, con. 2 for industrial purposes subject to the approval of the township engineer, the roads and a bylaw to be drafted to prohibit any tannery, junk yard, can manufacturing, wrecking, stock - yard or fat rendering.

The resolution met with Mr. Fenn's approval as it did not bar lumber or construction concerns.

Deer Season Cancelled In York County

The open season on deer has been cancelled for the entire area declared open on December 3rd, 4th and 5th the Department of Lands and Forests announced this week.

This includes the counties of Brant, Elgin, Essex, Haldimand, Halton, Huron, Kent, Lambton, Lincoln, Middlesex, Norfolk, Ontario, Oxford, Peel, Perth, Waterloo, Welland, Wellington, Wentworth and York. The deer season was also closed in the County of Durham; and the Township of South Monaghan, in the County of Northumberland.

The Department received resolutions from a majority of the county and township councils concerned including Pickering, Markham and Whitechurch, requesting closure.

The season was originally opened because of the increasing hazard to crops, woodlots and

travellers on highways, caused by increasing numbers of deer. Closure, it is stated, comes as a result of the apprehension of rural residents over the prospect of having deer hunters on their property.

Persons who bought deer licenses and now find themselves unable to use them may get refunds. Application forms may be obtained from Department Officers and from licence issuers. Each application should be signed by a Conservation Officer.
