STOUFFVILLE - Five grade ten students and two staff teachers from Stouffville District Secondary School have returned from a recent 12-day skiing trip to Innsbruck, Austria.

Taking part in the venture were - Sandi Davies, Heather Conolly, Monty Campbell, Sue Fréz, Jutta Manthau and teachers' Don Hamilton and John Lindop.

The trip was arranged for students from eastern Canada and the U.S. by Ships Schools Incorporated, a Toronto-based organization.

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SUN LIFE OF CANADA

Glare of sun may have caused death crash

STOUFFVILLE - An error in judgement, possibly caused by the glare of the sun, may have been responsible for a collision, Feb. 20, 1970, that took the life of Mrs. Betty MacKay, 40, conc. 6, Whitchurch, at the intersection of the Stouffville Road and conc. 7, Markham.

Also killed in the same crash was the driver, John McKenzie, 70, Toronto.

A coroner's jury, that included Ernest Hoover, Pat Ottaway, Ernest Beavon, Wm. Shearn and Neil Mortson, offered no recommendations.

Police investigations showed that the McKenzie car had partially completed a left-hand turn onto conc. 7 from the east. It was struck broadside by another driven by Alexander Nicol, 29, conc. 19th Avenue, Markham.

Mr. Nicol was seriously injured and unable to attend the hearing.

Mrs. MacKay, the mother of five, was also a foster mother for the Children's Aid Society. Three month old Sherry Snyder, in Mrs. MacKay's care and a passenger in the death car was among the injured.

Recommend curfew on snowmobiles

PICKERING - If the bylaw remains unchanged, a curfew will limit the night-time hours of operation for snowmobiles in Pickering Township.

South of the Macdonald-Cartier Freeway, the ban extends from 10 p.m. to 8 a.m. and north of the Freeway, from 12:30 a.m. to 8 a.m.

The bylaw also prohibits the machines on township road allowances, except where crossing roads at perpendicular angles; prohibits them on sidewalks and on private properties without the owner's permission.

Owners and non-owners were out in force at the meeting, each group expressing opinions, pro and con. The interruptions became so frequent that reeve John Williams finally cleared the gallery.

Planning director John Faulkner, speaking as a private citizen, said council should not concern itself with snowmobiles on township roads. With respect to noise, he

said they were not as bothersome as farm grain-dryers, trucks, tractors or motorcycles.

Mr. Umphrey, a resident near Brougham, said snowmobiles made no more noise than gravel trucks on the Brock Road.

Alfred Croxford of Pickering Beach made a point for the other side. He said they 'boomed by' eight feet from his child's bedroom window. He said that many used the roads in an irresponsible manner.

Councillor Jean McPherson said that one becomes accustomed to noise and soon does not notice it. "I go to bed to sleep,"

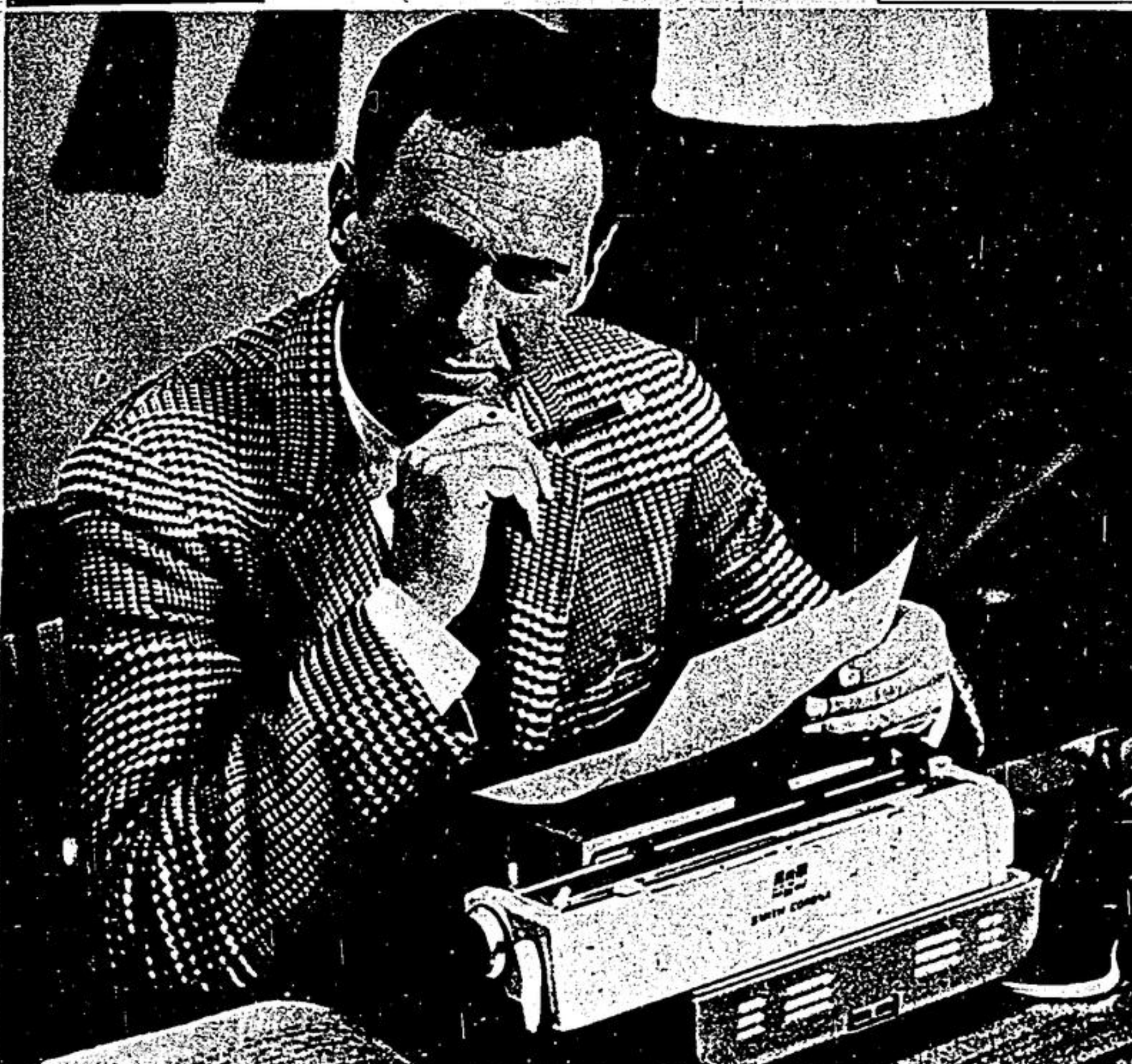
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
