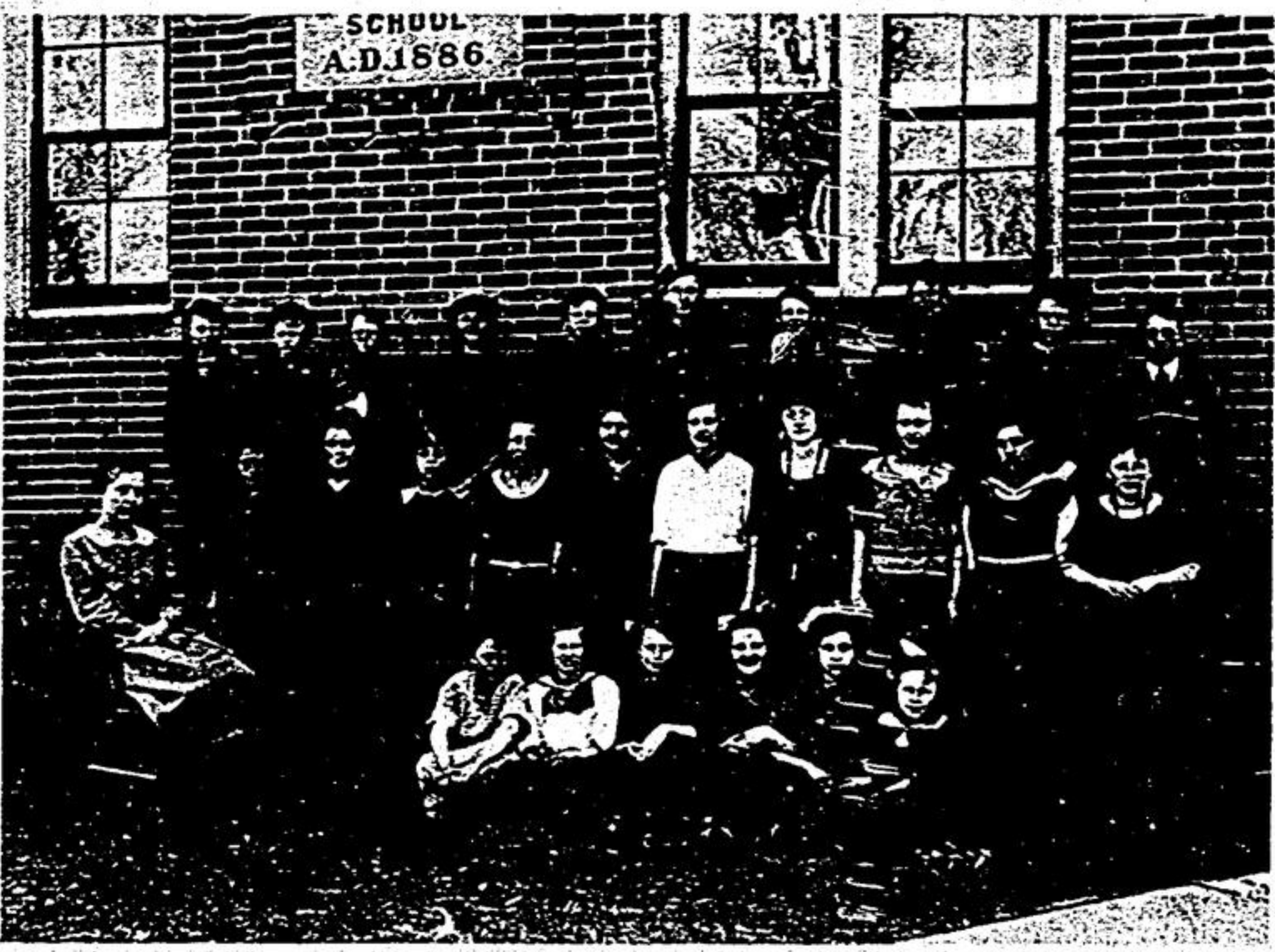
The Claremont Women's Institute is holding a euchre, Feb. 9 at the home of Mrs. Aldine Evans. The time is 1 p.m.
