Third hand facts

STOUFFVILLE - "I would like to meet the Stouffville policeman," wrote columnist Susan Ford in The Telegram issue of Feb. 3, "who a friend of mine observed Monday, helping a lady carry her bags from a supermarket to her car, then helped load her bags into the car. When finished, he gave her a ticket for illegal parking!"

It is obvious that Miss Ford did not take the time to check out the story with the Police Department or its Chief, Orland Keating. If she had, she would have learned that the lady's car was parked over the Main Street crosswalk. The officer (Constable Wm. Clause) was in the process of writing out a ticket when he saw her coming, her arms filled with groceries. He relieved her of the load and placed the bundles in the car. He then tore up the ticket and issued a warning instead.

Valley village slashed

UNIONVILLE - Despite restrictions imposed by the Department of Municipal Affairs on the construction of Village in the Valley, the developer intends to go ahead with plans for the subdivision. Planning Committee was told, Feb. 4, that the developer said the total area of the project had been slashed by nearly 50 acres.

The original plans included the development of nearly 172 acres, and the construction of 575 single family dwellings and 22 multiple dwellings. But the department has only authorized the construction of 123 single units and 17 multiples on a 123 acre site.

In explaining why the scope of the project had been limited, the department told planning committee it was acting on the advice of the Ontario Water Resources Commission.

The commission recommended that the area could accommodate a maximum of 2,500 people because of the limited excess capacity of the Unionville sewage treatment plant.

Before the limitations were imposed, the development would have attracted an estimated 3,600 people to the area.

Modifications from the department also stipulated that 15 acres must be set aside for a public school and park. The development, an extension of Varley Village, is located in the north-west corner of Unionville between concession 5 and 16th Avenue.
