Century City**Mistake - who must pay?****By Donald M. Deacon

The recent, alleged encouragement given Revenue Properties by five Ontario Cabinet Ministers to launch the "Century City" project in early 1968 is cause for a full explanation. The Ministers are said to have stated there was no plan before the government which would preclude the plan from proceeding. Attending the meeting were the Hon. Darcy McKeough with his Deputy Minister, W.H. Palmer, the Hon. Charles MacNaughton, the Hon. Stanley Randall, the Hon. George Gomme and the Hon. John Simonet.

It is difficult to condone several aspects of the meeting. First, the Provincial Ministers concerned ignored the existing planning authorities and chose to deal directly with private developers. Secondly, the construction of a major development between the communities of Stouffville and Goodwood would

completely disrupt the plans of the former municipality and Uxbridge Township and ignore the important planning principle of expanding on existing centres of community interest and strength.

Third, the development was well off existing and projected highway arteries which would be required for such a major centre. Fourthly, the plan completely contravened the then existing O.W.R.C. ban on large upstream sewage plants. And lastly, even though the Toronto Centred Region Plan was not yet completed the

preliminary MTARTS strongly favoured a band development concept along Lake Ontario.

Who is paying for these costly mistakes? It is the farmers who have sold out, their properties and now may have to re-establish themselves. It is the shareholders who have seen the

value of their shares decline to almost zero. It is the public who must pay nearly 750 million annually more for building lots because the province has not launched a well-financed, soundly based programme to overcome the acute shortage of building sites in the Toronto Centred Region.
