

Nothing to do in town?

STOUFFVILLE - is a lack of recreational facilities a problem among young people in Stouffville? Without exception, the teenagers interviewed on the question said 'yes' while their parents said 'no'.

"There really isn't much for teenagers in Stouffville", said Kathy Williams, Montreal Street. She feels that organized sports, dances every weekend and more skating time at the arena would improve the situation. She also suggested that a movie theatre would be a good idea 'with movies that a teenager could get in to see".

Astrid Jaago, Boyer Street agreed. She has lived in Stouffville for the past three years and finds that 'there really isn't that much to do'. Astrid, like Kathy, is a student at Stouffville District but finds that school activities aren't much help on weekends. She says that most of her friends go to Markham or Toronto for entertainment. Astrid would like to see more organized sports, dances and a show.

Like Astrid, Sherrin Watson, Main Street, thinks Stouffville ought to have a theatre. She feels that teenagers have little in town to keep them occupied. "While they aren't a problem now, they could become a problem in the future", she thinks. Sherrin says her 13 year old brother even with hockey practice and a paper route still wishes he had 'something to do' during weekends.

Ann Middleton, Burkholder Street, was the last teenager interviewed on the subject. Like Kathy and Astrid, Ann is a student at Stouffville District and finds that there 'isn't much excitement on weekends'. She says that she really isn't 'happy with the situation' and thinks there is 'plenty of room for improvement'. But Ann is philosophical about the problem. 'I'm used to making my own fun by now' she told The Tribune.

Parents, on the other hand, weren't that worried about the lack of recreational facilities here. Donald Wilkinson, Baker Street finds that his children 'seldom complain about not having anything to do'. He feels that Stouffville has as many organizations as most other

communities. "My kids have always managed to keep active and out of trouble", he said. Like Mr. Wilkinson, photographer Ted Cadieux doesn't feel teenagers in Stouffville had much to complain about.

"Young people don't seem to be able to make their own fun anymore", he said. "Kids tend to expect everything handed to them on a silver platter".

He suggested that teenagers who find themselves bored and without anything to occupy their time on a Saturday afternoon might consider volunteer work.
