

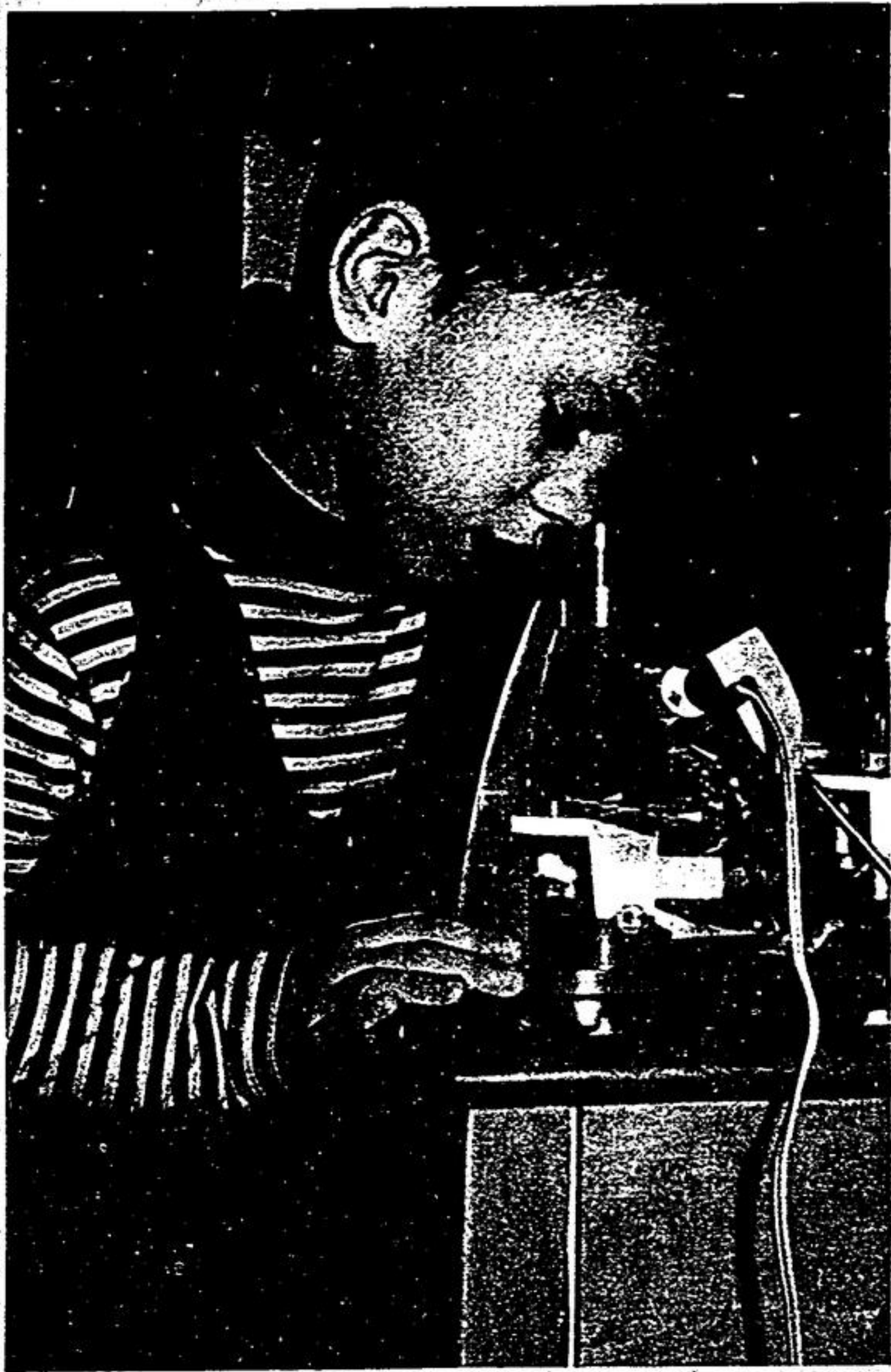
Human computers at 'fair'
