Sick of farm land hue and cry

PICKERING TWP. - Pickering Township Reeve John Williams said at the March 1 council meeting that he didn't know whether councillor Mrs. Jean McPherson was going blind or needed to clean her glasses when opposing a by-law to enlarge the garbage area, she stated that development was at a dead standstill and that "you could put it in a tea cup and have some left over."

She insisted that if development was taking place and people could build or sell, then perhaps they would be willing to accept the by-law.

The reeve declared that industry was moving, that something was indeed going on in Pickering Township.

Mrs. McPherson's statements resulted in big headlines, he said, but they detract from the progress the municipality is attempting to make.

The by-law to enlarge the garbage area to include all land south of the third concession was passed, with Mrs. McPherson the only dissenter. She said that to assess vacant land on a garbage mill

rate was hardly fair. "It is a different thing where there are built-up areas", she said. "vacant land does not create a garbage problem. Farms are assessed very high. Some are going to get \$50 to \$60 added to their taxes".

Williams said he got sick of listening to the

hue and cry about farm lands and declared that the township must keep moving ahead. If the Ontario Municipal Board did not approve the by-law, he said, then it's the Ontario Municipal Board that is holding up progress in Pickering Township. Some of the

properties on the north side of the third concession are included in the increased garbage area, but only those who have requested garbage collection.

Councillor Ron Chatten said that the by-law would be sent for approval to the O.M.B. and there would be a hearing.

Emerson Electric

Silent on package deal

MARKHAM - If Emerson Electric intends to accept the latest package offered by the Town of Markham on the extension of a sanitary sewer to their 35 acre plant in the Mt. Joy Industrial District, company spokesmen aren't saying.

"I absolutely refuse to discuss the issue", Vice-President John Saunderson told The Tribune.

"Our decision will be announced at the next council meeting. Until then no statement will be made".

Council's latest resolution passed Feb. 23, recommends that

Emerson assume the \$96,000 costs of extending the sewer to the company property on the corner of 17th Avenue and Highway 48.

Council has promised to reimburse the company half this amount if Emerson carries out its verbal promise to expand on their Markham site.

A week ago Emerson had been asked to assume \$170,000 of the \$100,000 costs of servicing the property with a \$69,000 sanitary sewer and a \$103,000 water main following a report from the

Engineering Department.

At that time Emerson stated they could only put \$40,000 towards the project and threatened to pull out of Markham unless an agreement was reached.

But Town Engineer D.M. Mukherjee says the "installation of a water main isn't essential". "While it is always preferable to service an area with town water, Emerson has enough well water for the sanitary sewer and fire prevention devices".

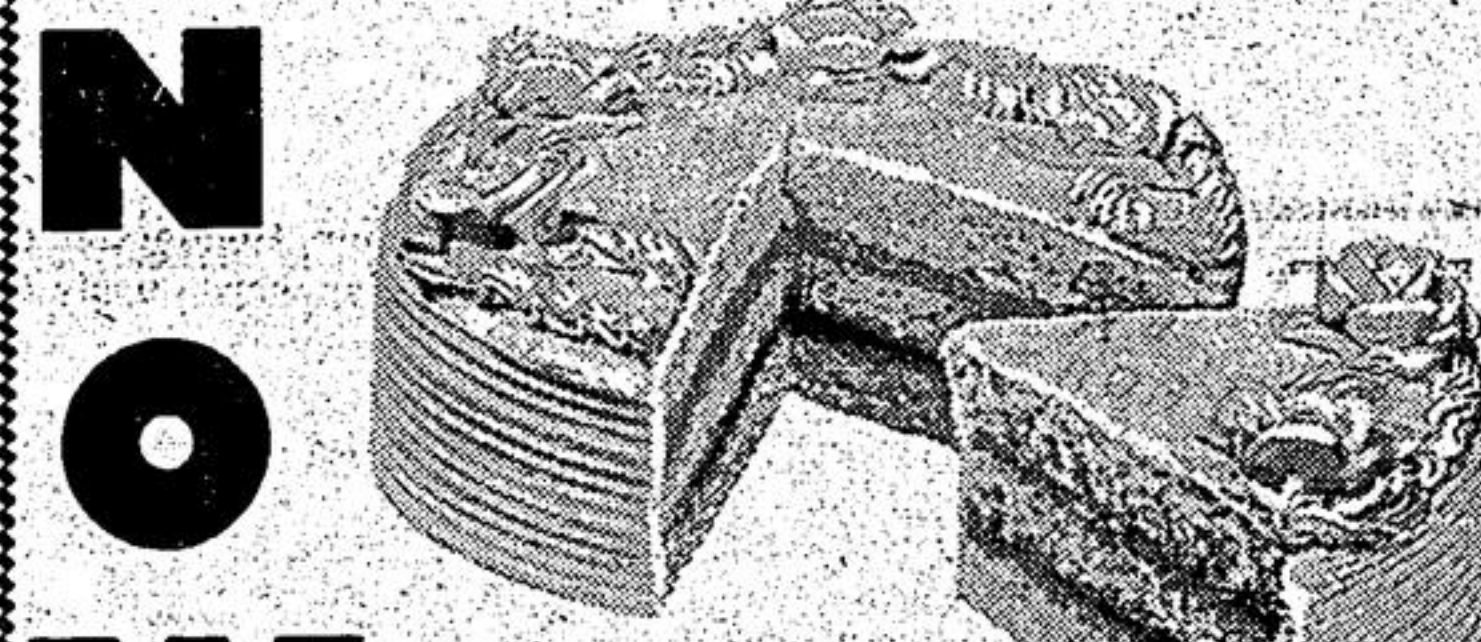
1971 TAXES

Ratepayers are hereby advised that payments made in the year 1971 will be in 3 instalments.

1st Instalment - due April 15th - being an interim payment of 40 mills based on assessment used in 1970.

The remainder of the taxes shall be divided into two equal instalments, namely the 2ND INSTALMENT and the 3RD INSTALMENT, to become due and payable on the 15th day of July and the 15th day of October, respectively.

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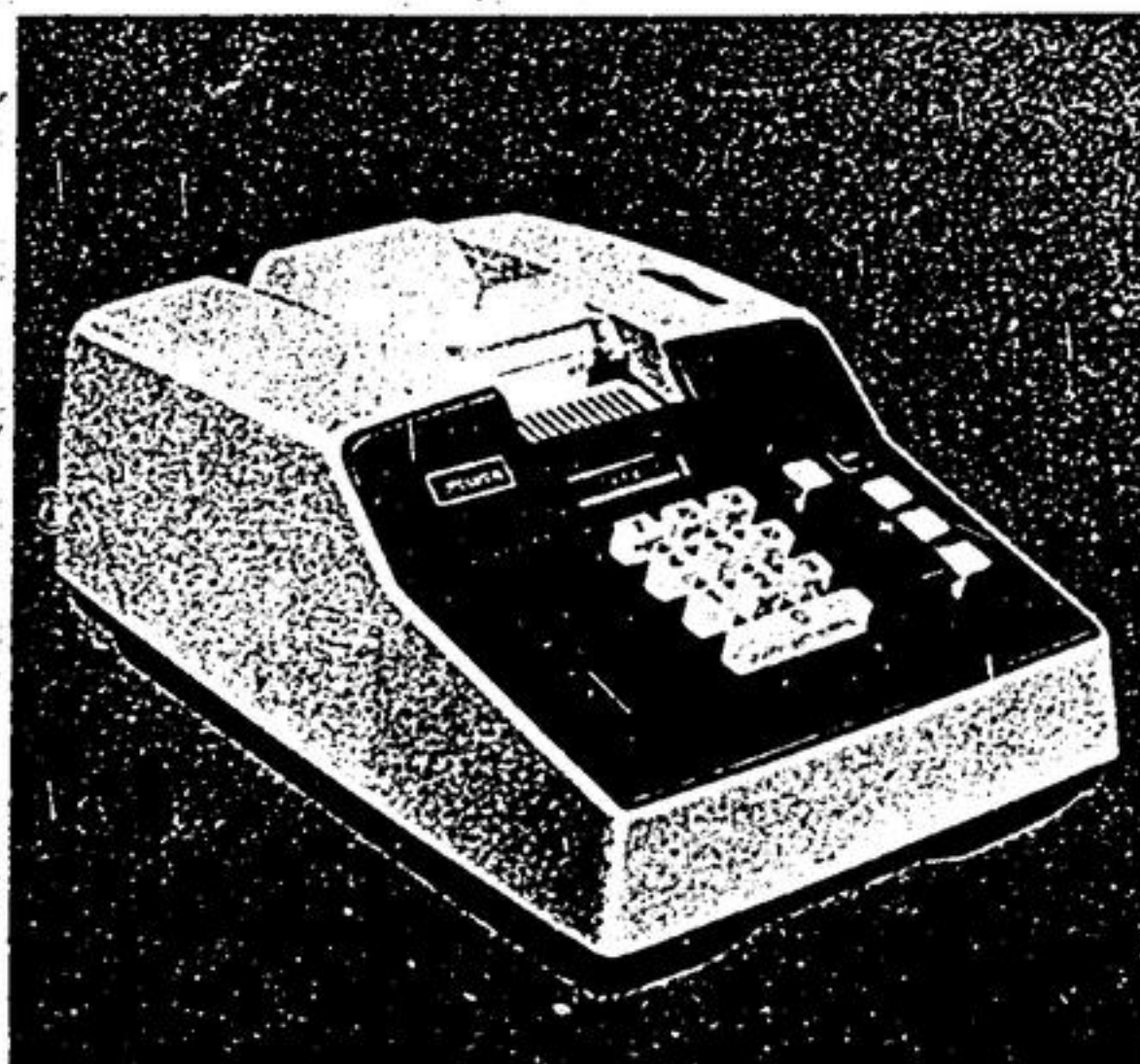
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
