For town Bantam team it's 'do-or-die' Friday

STOUFFVILLE - It's do-or-die for Stouffville's OMHA Bantam team, Friday. It's also now or never for Huntsville. The two clubs are all square as they head into the series' fifth and final game. The time is 8 p.m.
