The Society can supply dressings, some drugs such as pain killers and tranquilizers, house keeping services for a month, transportation to hospitals, meals for children left temporarily on their own, and small gifts to needy patients at Christmas and Easter. "But very few people realize these services are available for the asking", she told The Tribune. "Often we hear that someone is desperately in need of help from neighbours and friends".
