## Editor's Mail

# The other side of 'Century City'

Dear Mr. Thomas: Mr. Bernard Burnell's letter of April 1, dismissing Mr. Almack as misinformed, adds some interesting dimensions to the Revenue Properties - Century City dialogue. His solutions to some of the problems the community would have to face in the event of the development of Century City are disturbingly cavalier. In fact they generate more questions than answers.

Where is there a city with no pollution? People produce pollution. Mr. Burnell suggests a new type of sewage disposal. Where in Canada has a city used it successfully? How would it work in below freezing temperatures? Spraying the effluence of a city over the countryside in winter might indeed be spectacular.

Is it expensive? If it turned out to be too costly after the area was committed to the development would we be subjected to a conventional sewage disposal system after all? Ground water is a limited resource. What guarantee have we that the local well would not dry up when deep wells were drilled to draw off water enough for a city?

Is an agreement with Revenue Properties - Century City of any value? There are many reasons to doubt the credibility of their proposals. They have already failed to meet their mortgage and tax agreements. If they haven't sufficient funds to meet these

commitments how will they finance as grandiose a development as Century City? Or will the local tax-payer, through increased taxes, finance the services needed to get the development going?

How can industrial assessment be guaranteed? C.C.M. was offered 40 acres of land zoned for industrial purposes. Why have they not located in Uxbridge Township? Surely they don't need Century City to supply labour with Stouffville right at hand.

Could the fact that Revenue Properties has lost control of C.C.M. be the reason? Was the connection between Revenue Properties and C.C.M. made clear to begin with?

Has not the Department of Municipal Affairs denied giving this project prior approval?

Are we simply being talked into bailing out Revenue Properties. As a resident of the area who is interested in preserving our assets and keeping taxes within our ability to pay, I must express concern at the unconvincing and superficial arguments on behalf of Century City and wonder whether this kind of development might prove to be a disaster for the people of the area.

## Assault case in court

# Ten cent exchange leads to \$50 fine

**STOUFFVILLE** - A dispute over a pair of Coke bottles worth 10 cents led to the conviction of a Stouffville teacher on a charge of common assault.

John Lindop, Glengall Lane, was fined \$50 by Judge Robert Taylor in Richmond Hill Court, April 2 after he was convicted of striking Ray Ashley, Manager of the Becker's Milk Store.

Lindop told the court the dispute over the Coke bottles arose after he sent his 13 year old daughter to the Becker's Store to do some shopping. She returned later and said the manager refused to give her the cash equivalent.

"I went to the store to discuss the situation when Ashley took a 25 cent piece out of the till and threw it at me striking me in the chest. He also insulted me in front of four or five people," Lindop told the court.

He said he left immediately to do his shopping elsewhere but returned to the store later, thinking that an apology might be forthcoming.

"I didn't enter the store with aggressive intent. I went back to straighten the affair out because I don't like hard feelings with anyone. But when Ashley moved towards me pointing his finger at the door and shouting at me to get

out, I hit him".

Taking the witness stand, Ray Ashley told the court Lindop had made three visits to the store and became more aggressive each time. On the third visit, he alleged Lindop hit him on the side of the face knocking his glasses off and throwing him against the shelves.

Ashley's testimony was substantiated by evidence given by 17 year old Karen Work, Ninth Line, Stouffville, an employee of Becker's. She told the court Lindop's back was towards her and she didn't actually see him hit Ashley. But, she said, she heard a smacking noise and saw Ashley fall against the shelves.

Acting as his own defence council, Lindop called Constable Orland Keating to the stand. Keating told the court he discussed the charge with Ashley shortly after the incident took place. He testified Ashley told him he didn't want to go ahead with the charge but the company forced him to prosecute.

In asking that the charge be withdrawn, Lindop told the court he was provoked into slapping Ashley. Introducing a letter from Dr. Blair Mitchell confirming that he had been under treatment for a nervous disorder, Lindop described the assault

as a 'reflex action' and an involuntary motion.

But Judge Robert Taylor disagreed. In handing down sentence he told the court he felt Lindop was the aggressor. "I'm

surprised a man of your stature in the community would get involved in a quarrel over 10 cents", he said.

Mr. Lindop was given until April 16 to pay the fine.
