STOUFFVILLE - A 72 year old Stouffville man who testified he 'seldom touched a drop of liquor' was convicted of impaired driving in Richmond Hill Court, April 2.

Police testimony revealed Frederick Hooper of Main Street was followed from Baker Avenue to his home by officers of the Stouffville detachment who arrested him as he was getting out of his car.

The vehicle driven by the accused was said to have swerved out of control on Baker Avenue, mounting the sides of snowbanks. Hooper was described as being unsteady on his feet and smelling of alcohol.

A breathalyzer test revealed a reading of 180 milligrams of alcohol in his blood.

Hooper told the court he was against the consumption of alcohol and 'was never actually a drinker'. He testified that he had been at a party on the night the offence occurred and had nothing to eat since early that morning.
