Bell firm pioneer

STOUFFVILLE - Few if any residents in Stouffville will recall the era prior to the turn of the century when the Bell Telephone Company operated a unique battery switchboard on Main Street.

The late William Alexander Clark and his wife Elizabeth were in charge of the exchange, located on the site of the present Marguerite Shoppe. On April 7, another generation member of that well-known family passed away. Alice Beatrice (Bert) Clark died at Sunnycrest Nursing Home, Whitby. She was 89. Miss Clark was a pioneer member of the Bell Telephone Club, a firm that has made much progress since the days when her father would pedal messages by bicycle to homes outside the village. Born near Maple, she deceased had been in declining health for the past seven years. Miss Clark was identified with the United Church and the service Friday, from the Dixon Parlors, Markham, was taken by Rev. Donald Parr. Interment was in Elmwood Cemetery. Surviving are nieces, Dorothy (Mrs. Earl Reaume) and Donalda (Mrs. James Murtagh) of Don Mills, Eleanor (Mrs. George Blachford), Grand Rapids, Michigan and two nephews, William Clark, Newmarket and Paul Baker, Also of Grand Rapids.
